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What we Heard

Feedback Summary

In June 2024, RMOW engaged with the community during 3 pop-up open house events and an online survey that was available for 2 weeks. These are the main themes formed from conversations with the public and their input on the map/comment board.

4) Did you attend the Meadow Park Pop-Up booths at Whistler Public Library or Meadow Park Sports Centre in June 2023?

Yes: 14.4% (39 Respondents)

No: 81.9% (221 Respondents)

I can't remember: 3.7% (10 Respondents)

1/ Excitement for playground and splash park upgrade

- A number of responses from the engagement were resoundingly positive in regards to the playground and splash park.
- Many community members were excited about the potential for an integrated splash park and playground, with many families providing more ideas ranging from more water slides to shade structures to allow play in all four seasons .

2/ A park for the community, not a destination park

- Many Whistler residents expressed that this park be designed with the local community in mind, working to provide places for neighbours to connect and come together for gatherings and;
- Concerns were raised that this park risks is becoming a destination park. The park must reach a fine balance of upgraded amenities and character without becoming too iconic
- These comments were reflected in survey responses despite only 14% of survey respondents attending pop-up booths (see page 20);



3/ Keep the baseball fields

There were numerous queries about what would be happening to the baseball diamonds that currently exist at Meadow Park.

Many comments were made that one baseball diamond could be kept, perhaps integrated into other programs such as the open lawn or dog park.

4/ Protecting the River of Golden Dreams

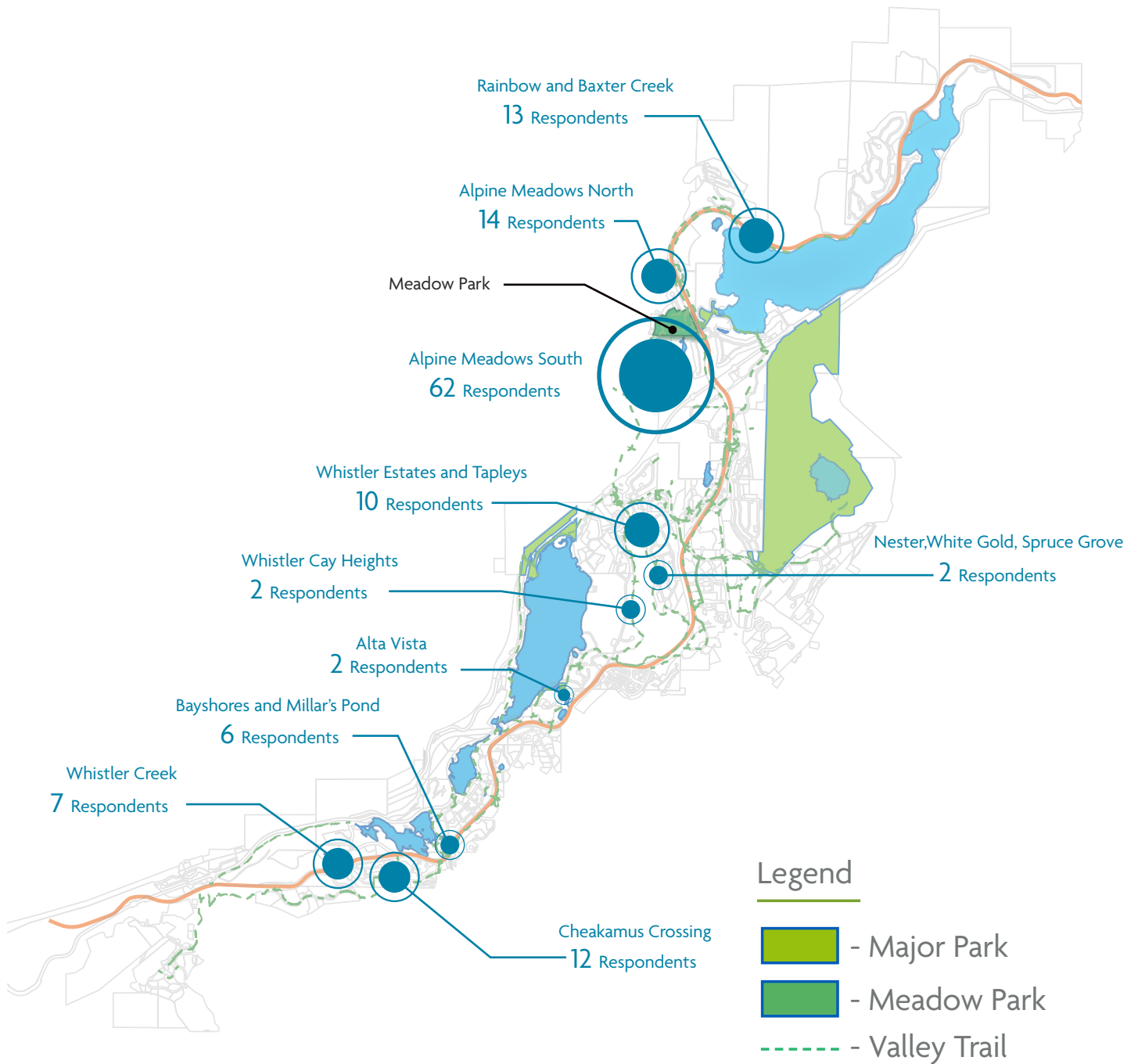
- Another common theme from the engagement was the concern of providing river front access to Meadow Park users, especially dogs and how this may disturb the sensitive riparian habitat.
- Residents were concerned that providing any river front access is valuable in Whistler and will create a destination and risk attracting too many visitors to the area.

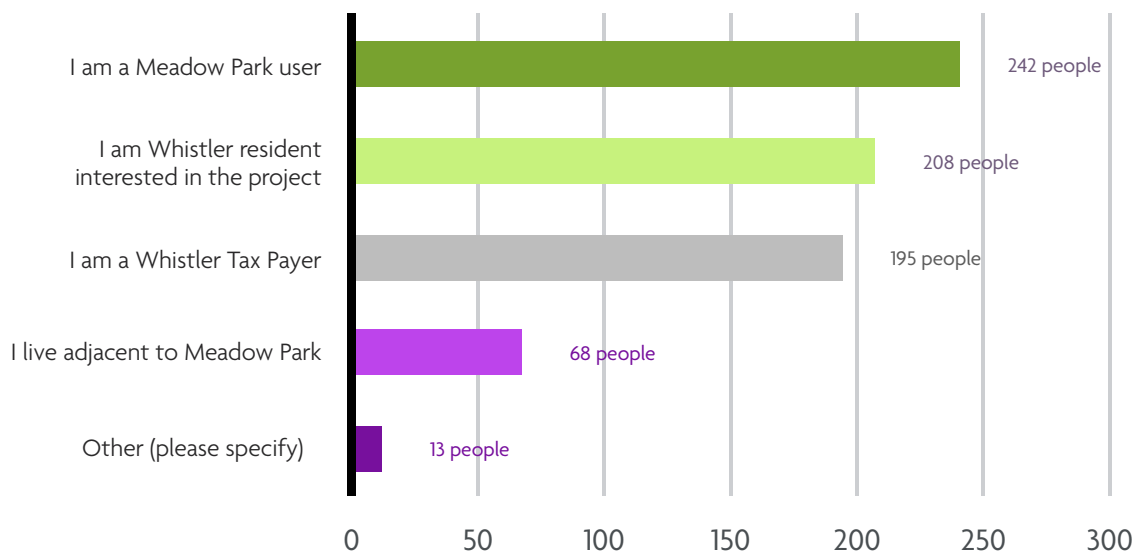

What is your connection to Meadow Park? (Select all that apply)

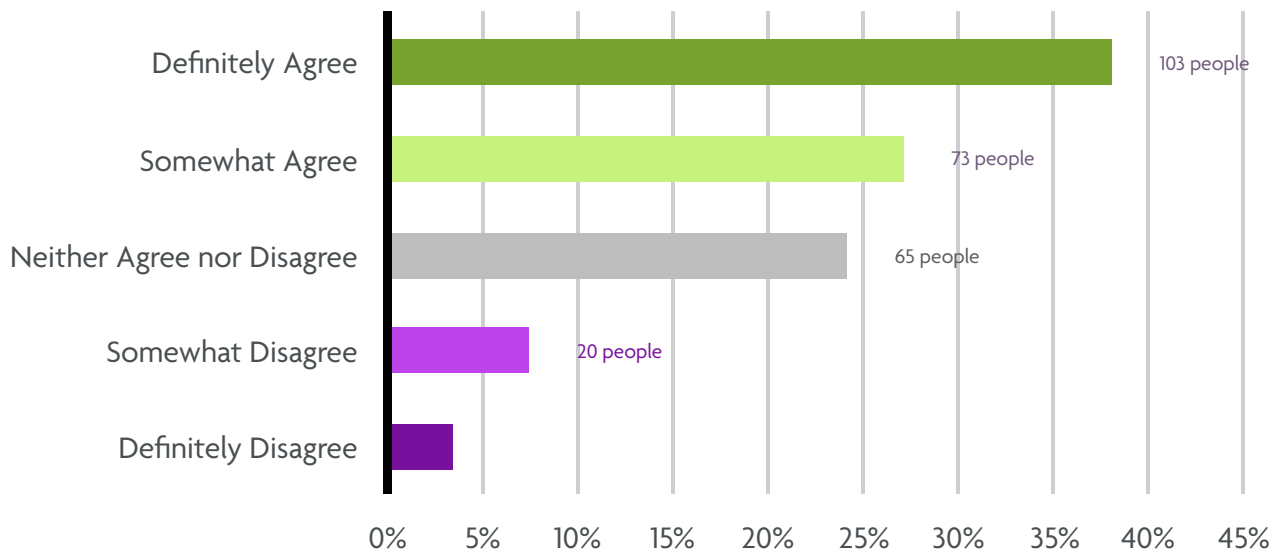

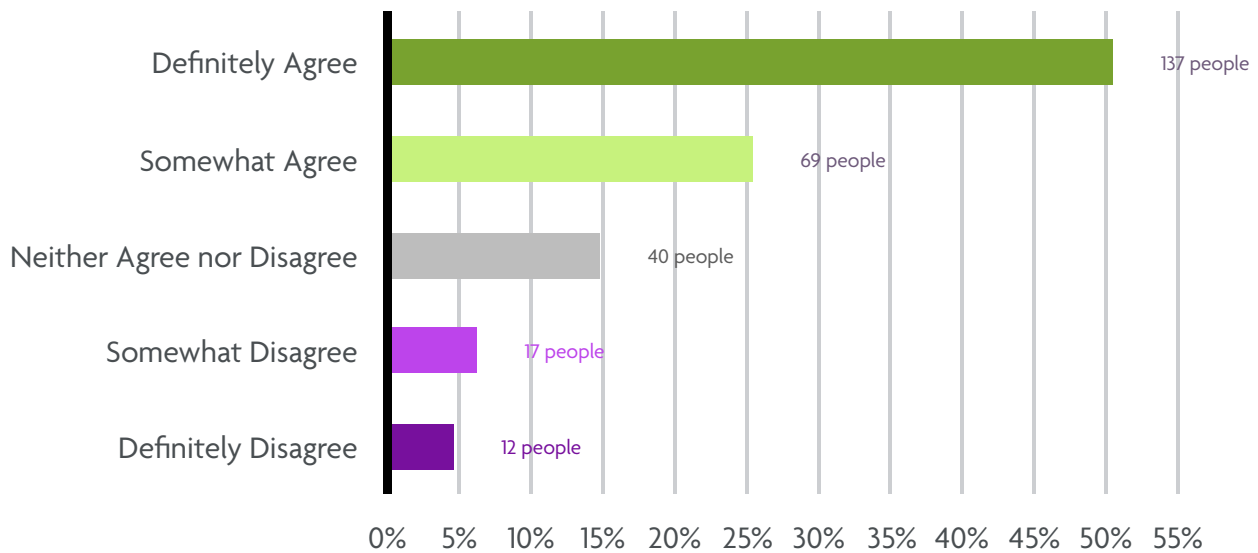

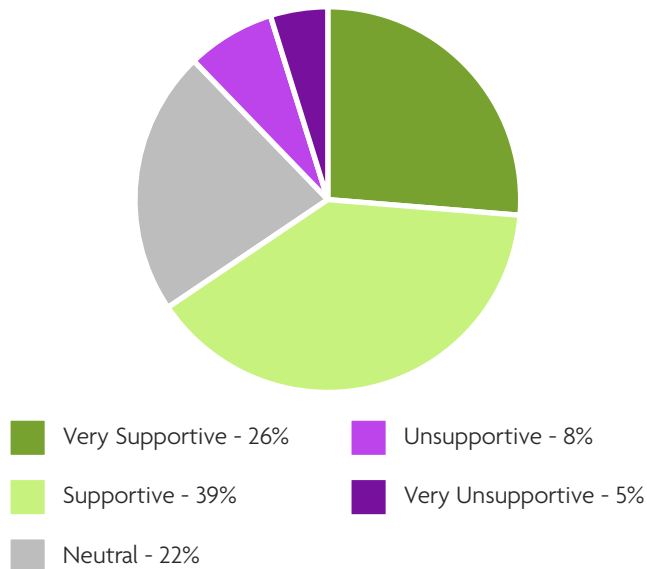
- No comments were mentioned by respondents on the walking loop.

The area dedicated to the Spray Park is sufficient

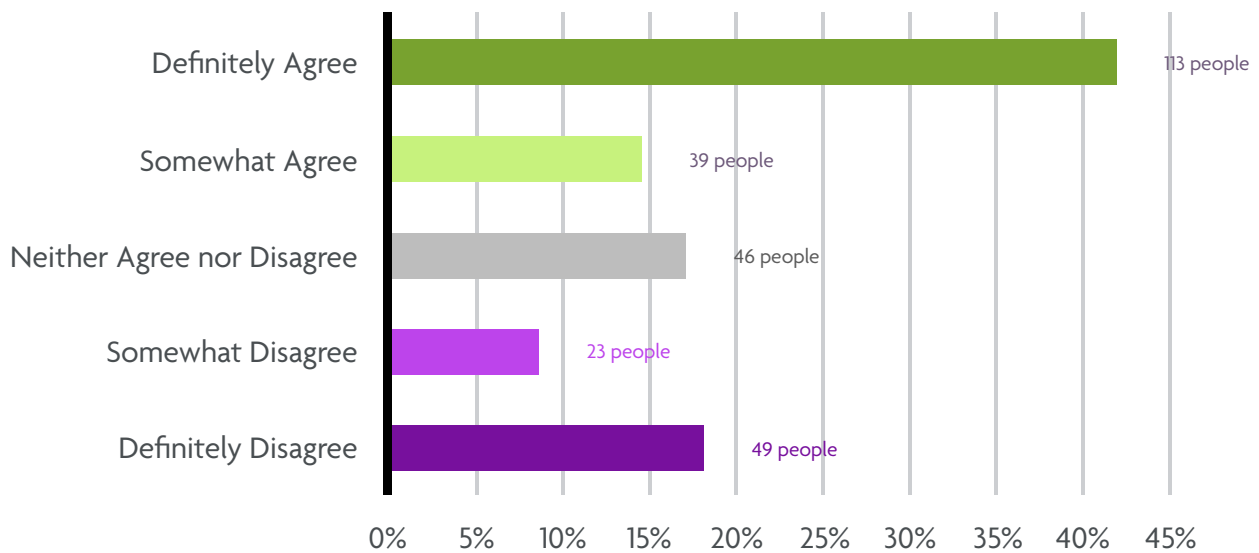


Overall, how supportive are you of the draft concept for the Spray Park?

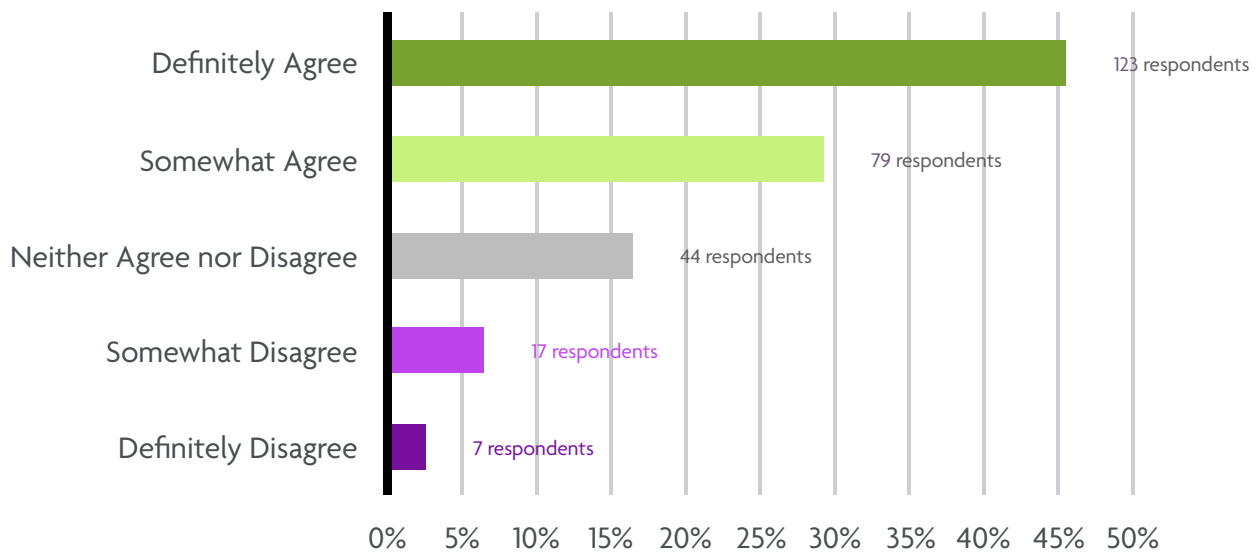

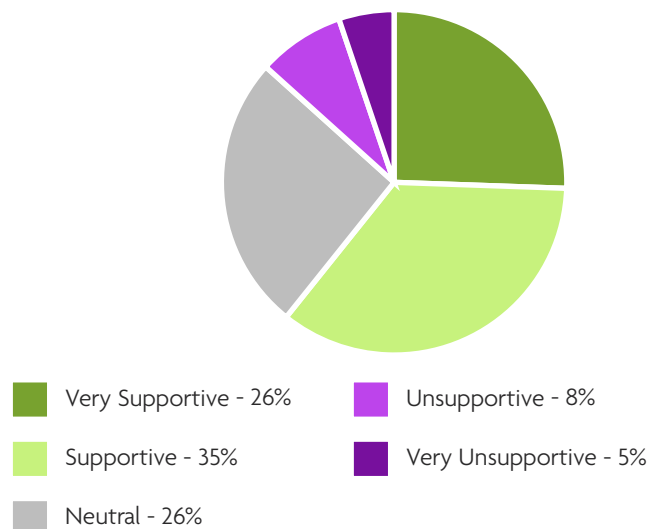

The area dedicated to the Playground is sufficient

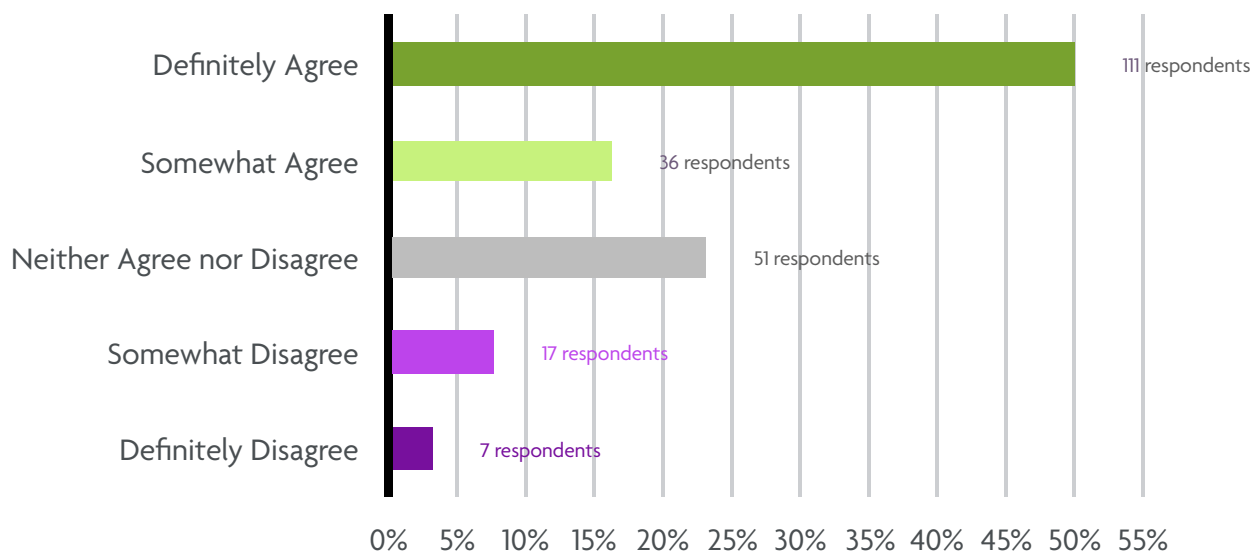


Overall, how supportive are you of the draft concept for the Playground?

Key Takeaways

- Of those who will use the spray park (answers = Definitely agree; Somewhat agree), 82% of them agree that the spray park area is sufficient.
- Four comments mention the importance of providing accessible playground features such as swings for wheelchair users.

“ I would much rather see sand, wood mulch, grass, and cement as the surfaces used for the play areas and splash pads...”

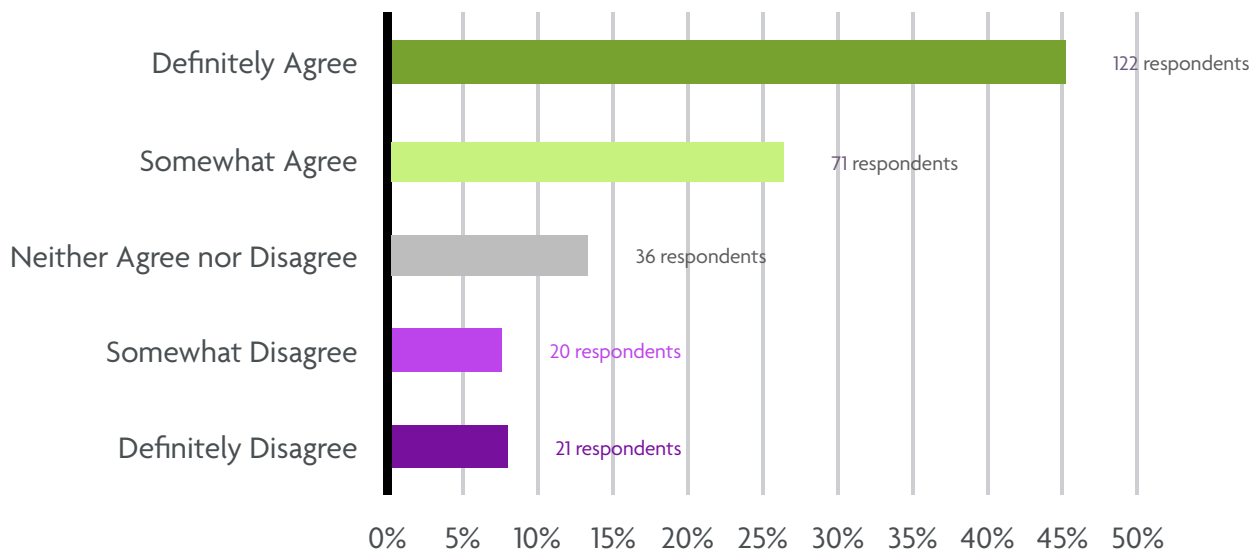

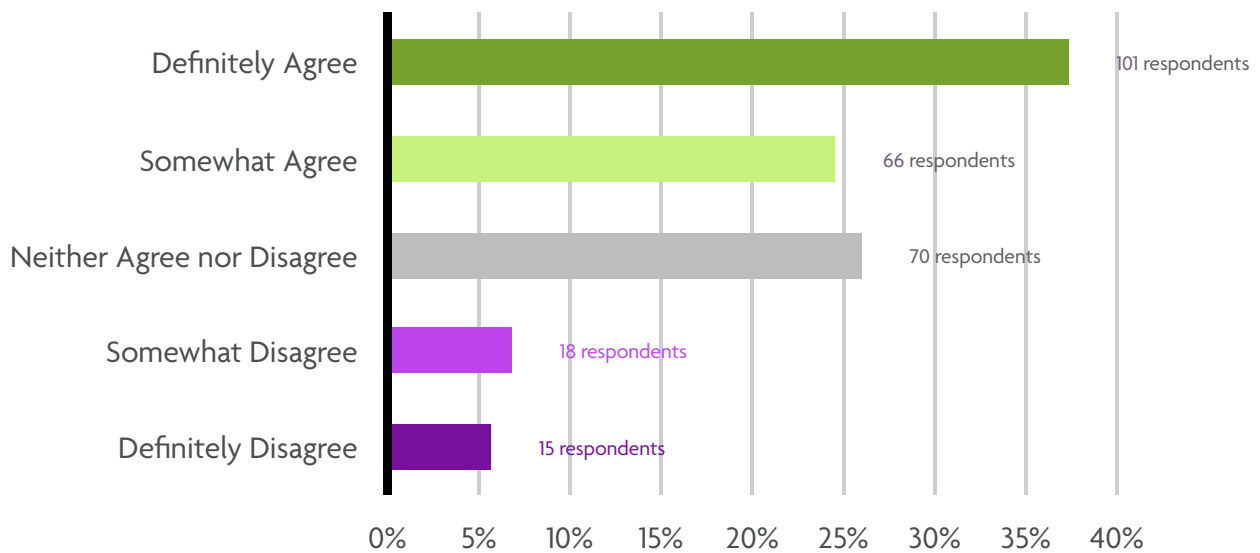

The area dedicated to the Youth Area is sufficient

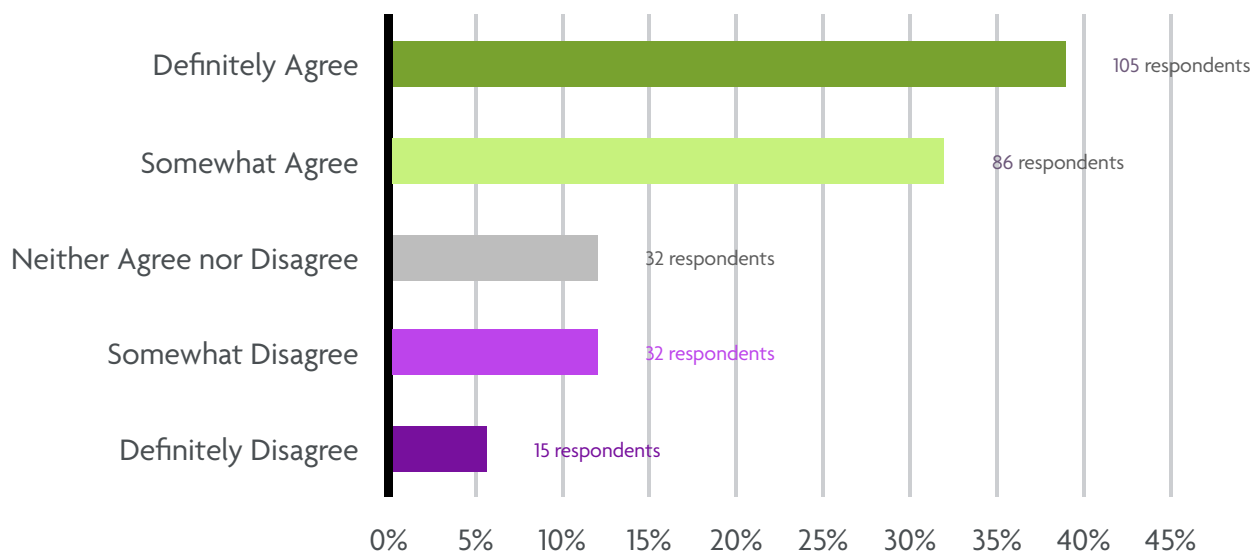


Key Takeaways

- Of the 11 respondents under 24, only 1 person disagreed that the Youth Area was not sufficient.
- Most respondents agreed that the youth area was important and that noise mitigation was critical for its success.
- Other respondents (3) noted that there should be expansion of programs for Youth Area from parkour to other types of program such as skate park, climbing, and pump tracks.

Please indicate to what extent you agree with the following:

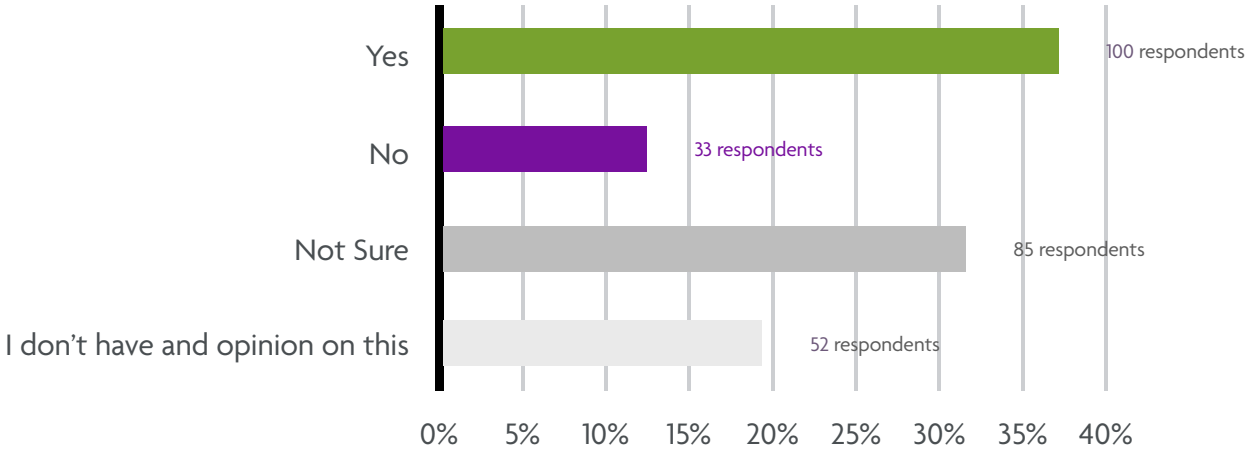
The area dedicated to the River front Picnic Area is sufficient



Key Takeaways

- 5 respondents noted that more picnic tables should be installed with some accessible seating.
- Some concerns were noted in bringing any access at all to the riverfront area with the sensitive ecosystem, whereas others wanted to have more access to the riverfront for their dogs.
- If a picnic area is provided next to the riverfront, it may encourage swimming which has strengths and weaknesses depending on which survey respondent was asked.

Is there sufficient seating in the draft Meadow Park Master Plan?



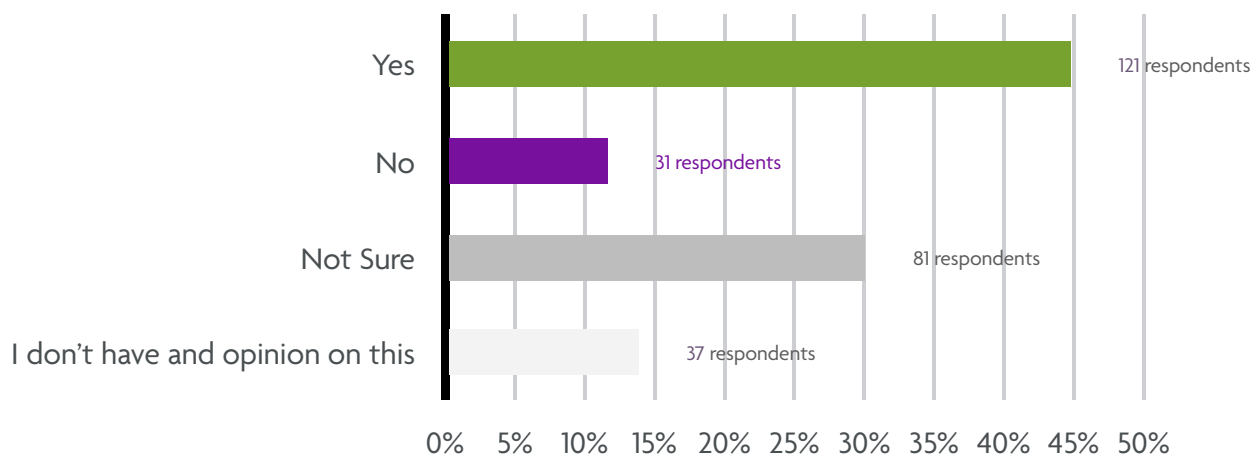
If you answered 'no', please tell us where you'd like to see increased seating

- Many comments supported placing seating next to the water park and playground areas as ideal spaces for supervising children. It is also important to have tables near these playground and spray zones for parents and children to eat or do certain types of activities.
- A few have noted the lack of picnic tables in the picnic area and that there need to be more. Picnic tables and seating were also noted to be missing near the water .

“ There should be increased seating by the water play and playgrounds in sun and shade for parents to supervise their kids. ”

If you answered 'no', please tell us where you'd like to see increased seating

- There are a few notable mentions of setting up shade sails above the playgrounds as most play structures in Whistler can get quite hot and cannot be used in the summer. Covered play areas are also noted to be important during the rainy months of the year.
- There are conflicting opinions about whether shade should be done at the periphery or at the center of the park. Some feel that having pockets of shade are important spanned throughout the open lawn whereas others would like them kept to the periphery for a variety of reasons - sunbathing and paragliding.

“ More is better. Make sure there are shade areas through the play areas and open space, not just on the periphery. ”

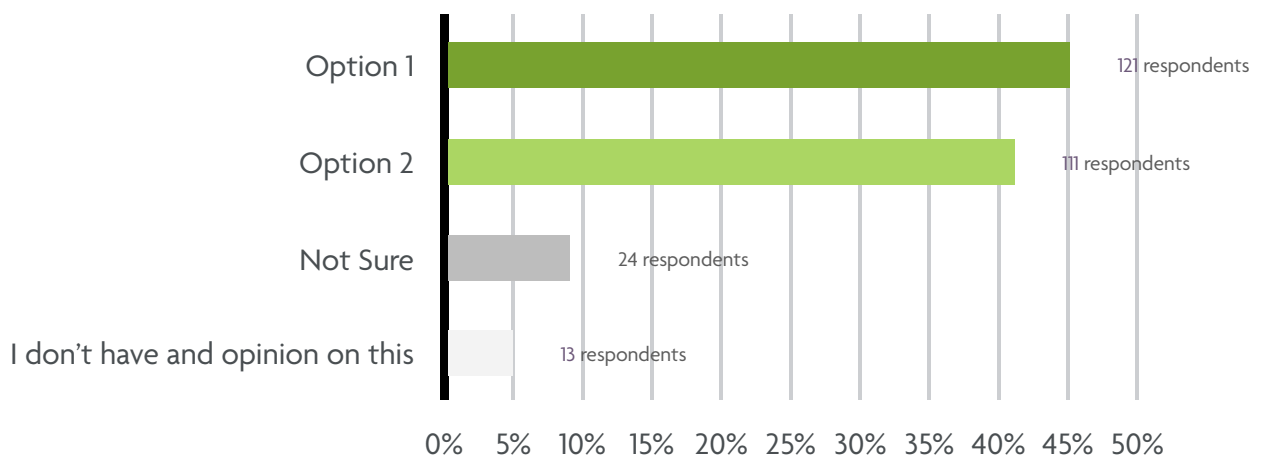
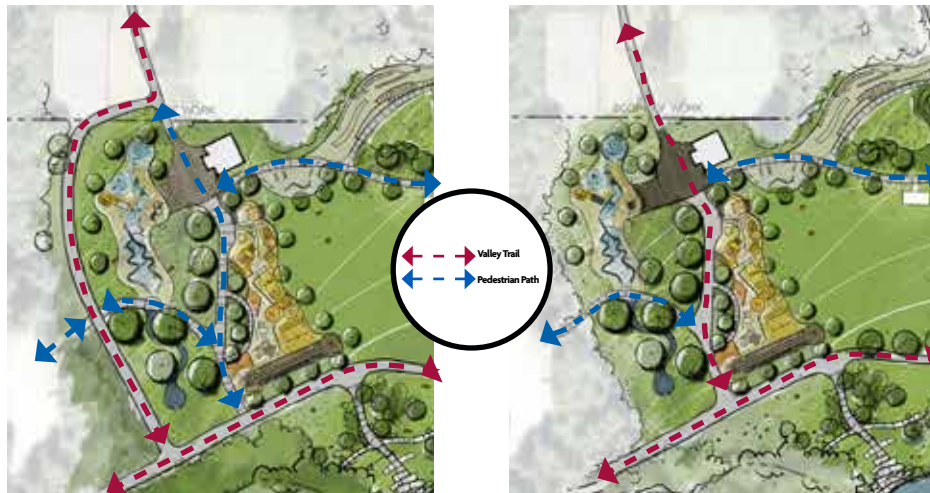
My preference for the Valley Trail alignment adjacent to the Splash Park and Playground is

Option 1: Relocated North/South Valley Trail

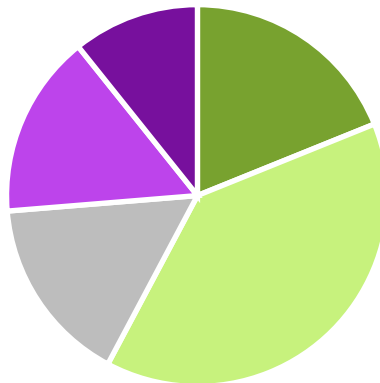
- Relocation of path around playground and spray park.
- Change made to enhance safety of park visitors.
- Particularly beneficial for children who frequent these areas.
- Moving path reduce risk of collisions between park visitors and cyclists.

Option 2: Retain Valley Trail as Shared Path

- Promote shared zones.
- Materiality change, signals to cyclists that they should slow down.
- This change has been made to enhance the safety of park visitors.
- Reinforces the idea of the park as a destination and not a corridor.

General Concerns

“ I’m concerned that the end goal with this plan is to make another beautiful space and not taking the recreational needs of our community seriously. Sport keeps children busy and provides working opportunities in coaching, officiating etc. It’s necessary for building confidence, and supports mental health. ”

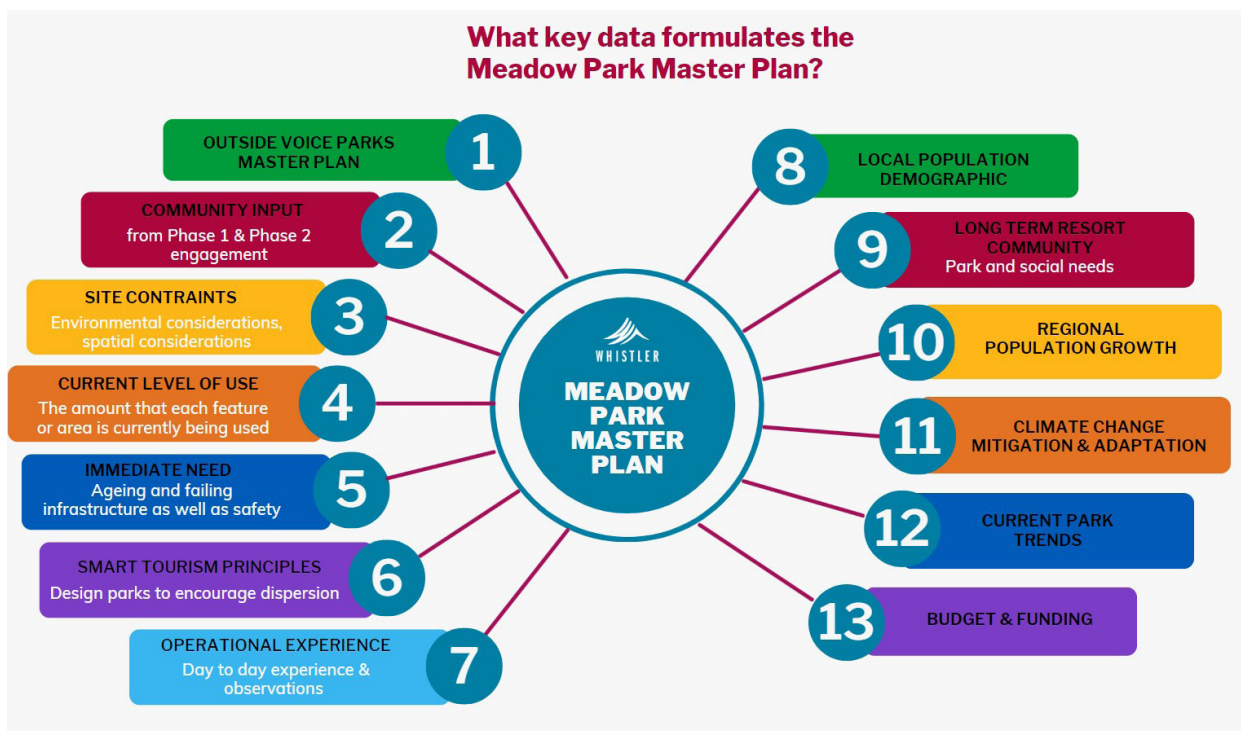

Next Steps

Currently, the RMOW (Resort Municipality of Whistler) only has funding for Phase 1, which includes the splash park and playground. The design consultant and municipal staff will carefully review and consolidate survey responses, integrating them where feasible into the Phase 1 design and the draft master plan. As of now, the second phase of the project lacks funding, and RMOW will undergo several steps to refine the design once funding becomes available.

The graphic below illustrates that community input is just one of many factors influencing the development of the Meadow Park Draft Master Plan. Feedback from respondents, in conjunction with best design practices, amenities present in the neighborhood, and existing policy guidelines for neighborhood-level parks, will shape the final design of the new park.





Please Note:

While a variety of tactics were used to reach a diverse range of citizens, results from open surveys such as those provided do not represent a statistically significant, random sample of all Whistler and surrounding area residents. Due to the opt-in and open nature of participation, results do not necessarily reflect the views of all Whistler residents.

Additional efforts were made to connect with harder-to-reach communities via affected parties and community liaison networks; however, under-represented groups and individuals remain under-represented in the overall results.

Additionally, results may not be representative of groups experiencing housing need, including those experiencing homelessness or accessing housing with supports.

Overview



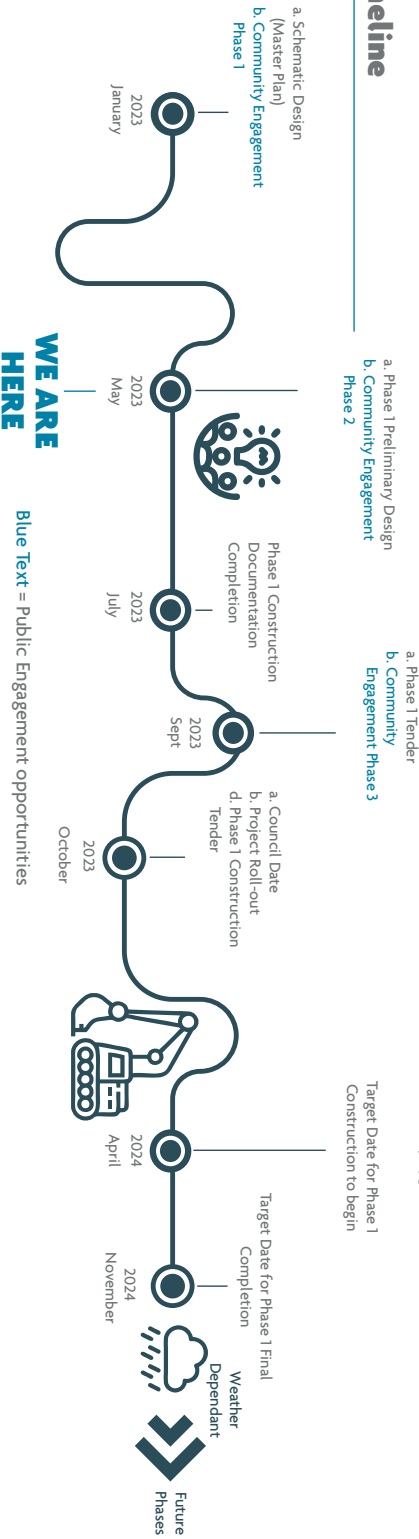
- Meadow Park was constructed almost 40 years ago.
- Requires reinvestment for climate change resilience, improving public safety, and addressing aging infrastructure.
- It serves as a destination park and community amenity hub.
- Whistler parks visitation has rapidly increased, with over 176,000 visits to four destination parks in summer 2021 (Lost Lake Park, Rainbow Park, Lakeside Park and Alpha Lake Park).
- This project aims to enhance the user experience of Meadow Park by improving the comfort level and upgrading the existing infrastructure.

Design Considerations



- The design for Meadow Park will be implemented in phases, with the initial phase focusing on revitalizing the spray park and playground.
- The Meadow Park **master plan** includes several key features, such as expansive areas of open space, a dedicated enclosed area for off-leash dogs, direct access to the River of Golden Dreams, and the renovation of the playground and spray park facilities.
- The proposed **spray park** includes different elements like a water slide, ground sprays, and other features. It also acknowledges the nearby natural features and integrates the concept of water conservation.
- The proposed **playground** has numerous opportunities for climbing and swinging, along with a sizable zipline, all situated on a resilient rubber play surface and wood fibre, ensuring accessibility and enhancing safety in comparison to the current playground.

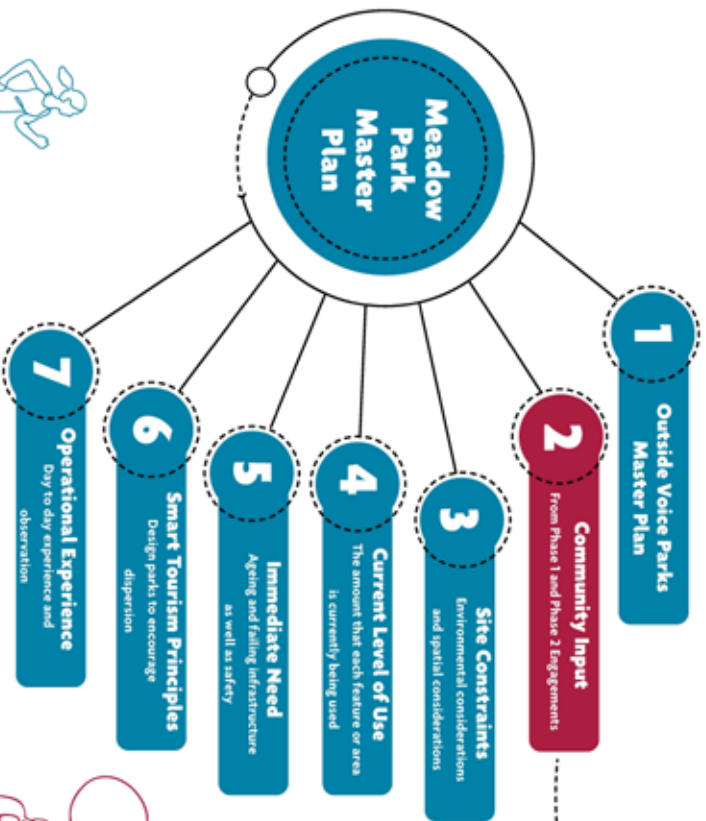

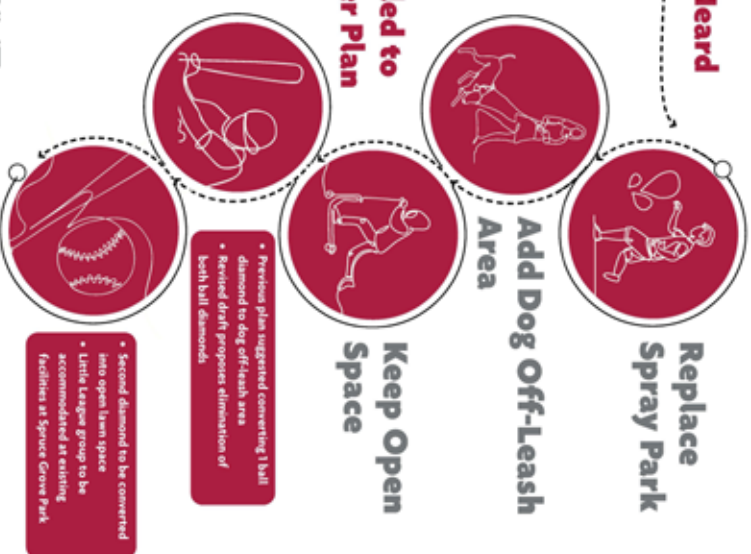

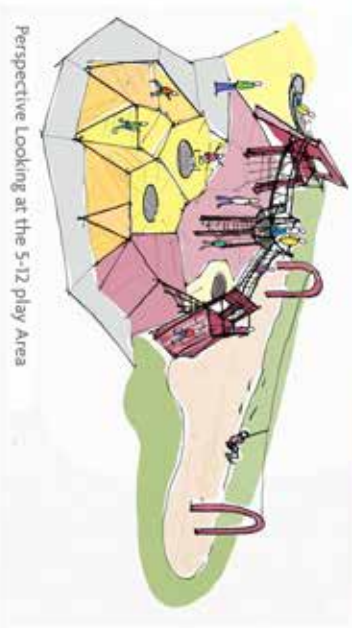
