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#### 1 Overview

#### 1.1 Introduction: The Resort Municipality of Whistler

Situated within the shared, unceded territory of the Lilwat7úl (Lil'wat People) and Skwxwú7mesh (Squamish People), the Resort Municipality of Whistler (RMOW) is a destination resort community, local government organization and leader in providing municipal programs, services, progressive planning and infrastructure for almost 14,000 permanent residents and over three million annual visitors. One of Whistler's major attractions is its extensive park system and multi-use Valley Trail network linking key destinations throughout the Valley.

#### 1.2 Purpose of the EOI

The purpose of this request for expressions of interest / statements of qualifications (the "RFEOI/SOQ") is to:

- Invite submissions (the "Submission") from respondents (the "Respondent") that describe the desire, relevant expertise, capability, reputation and resources of the Respondent to undertake the project as generally set out in Section 2 Scope of Work; and
- 2. To select a Respondent or Respondents who may be invited to participate in the next stage of the competitive selection process, if called.

This RFEOI/SOQ is not a solicitation of proposals; rather it is a non-binding invitation to qualified Respondents to make themselves known to the RMOW by providing information and by demonstrating to the RMOW their desire, relevant experience, qualifications, capability, reputation and available resources.

All interested parties should respond to this RFQOI/SOQ as the RMOW does not guarantee that a more formal procurement process (as determined at the RMOW's discretion) will be issued following this RFQOI/SOQ and may elect to directly negotiate with one or more interested parties, or the RMOW may at any time and at its sole discretion decide to cancel this process for any reason.

The RMOW is offering interested Respondents the opportunity to express their interest in providing consulting services to assist municipal staff in the development a Parks and Valley Trail Strategy, within Whistler BC. The Respondent should be skilled and with demonstrated prior experience in parks and open space strategic planning and master planning, landscape architecture, community and land-use planning, community engagement and public interest group engagement.

The Respondent's Team should consist of professionals with the following backgrounds:

- Landscape Architecture
- Urban Planning
- Municipal park management

Members of the Respondent's Team should be in good standing with their respective professional associations where appropriate (ie. BC Society of Landscape Architects). The Respondent is welcome to propose other team members or disciplines as they feel may be required by the Work.

This Expression of Interest is **NON-MANDATORY** and is not a pre-qualification event. There will be no evaluation, ranking, or selection of suppliers as a result of this EOI. If subsequent competitive bidding opportunities are issued, RMOW is under no obligation to advise any supplier responding to this EOI. Suppliers should monitor the BC Bid website (<a href="www.bcbid.ca">www.bcbid.ca</a>) and RMOW's Business Webpage <a href="https://www.whistler.ca/business">https://www.whistler.ca/business</a> for such opportunities, which will be open to all suppliers, whether or not a response to this EOI was submitted.

#### 1.3 Project Background

Whistler's parks and Valley Trail system are a cornerstone of the Whistler experience. Many of the parks are in outstanding locations, have a full suite of typical park amenities, and they provide diverse outdoor recreation opportunities. Visitation at municipal parks in the summer season has grown significantly in recent years, particularly at waterfront parks. This has been placing pressure on infrastructure and maintenance, as well as creating capacity and conflict issues. Park infrastructure is in some cases approaching the end of its useful lifespan, infrastructure technology and operational approaches have changed, and new parkland has been acquired. Additionally, the community's demographic needs and perspectives on tourism have evolved significantly since the parks were built over 30 years ago, and the municipality is faced with new financial realities.

With the Whistler resident and visitor populations growing and the needs of the community changing, the strategic planning of parks and trails has also changed including new programming opportunities and a shift to reinvestment over new development. As well, important background considerations need to be considered such as climate change, ecological integrity and stewardship, First Nations, accessibility and inclusivity, active transportation, complete communities, refuge from tourism busyness, and the uniqueness of Whistler.

Building off the Parks Vision plan from 1996, the Recreation and Leisure Master Plan completed in 2015, the 2019 Official Community Plan, and the 2019 Draft Parks Master Plan; the 2024 Whistler Parks and Valley Trail Strategy will guide the future of Whistler's parks and Valley Trail over the next 10 years and beyond. The Strategy will help identify priorities that define the future direction, philosophy, policies, and actions and create a framework for future decisions.

#### 1.4 The Site

The Strategy will focus on both Whistler's Park system as well as the Valley Trail network.

The park system consists of 9 major resort parks, 13 neighbourhood parks, 13 natural parks, 3 sports fields owned by School District 48 (See Appendix 1). Also included are the 6 Village Parks - Whistler Olympic Plaza, Florence Petersen Park, Village Park (Amenity Stream), Fitzsimmons Creek Park (Fitzsimmons Bike Park, Whistler Skatepark), Rebagliati Park and Peace Park. The existing spectrum of park types varies based on location, size, and amenities available.

The Valley Trail is a non-motorized, multi-use, paved trail and boardwalk network, connecting Whistler's neighbourhoods, major parks, lakes, commercial centres and schools. The network is more than 50-kilometre

long and is built and maintained for year-round use (See Appendix 2). More recently, the Valley Trail has become a focus for active transportation purposes although its primary purpose remains a recreational trail experience.

#### 1.5 Budget

The approximate budget for this project is \$25,000CDN, and reflects the need to assist municipal staff in developing this strategy. We request proponents to advise the work from the list of tasks within 2.1 Scope of Work that they can provide for within this budget. Proponents are invited to submit value add tasks with accompanying cost estimates for consideration by the RMOW.

## 2 Scope of Work

#### 2.1 Overview of Scope

The scope of work includes, but is not limited to, the following tasks:

#### Part 1 - Introduction

Review and link to existing municipal plans and foundational documents.

#### Part 2 - Planning Process and Engagement

- Development of, and participation in, a community outreach and engagement strategy to facilitate input from the public and interest groups; and
- Coordinate and lead 2 rounds of public and interest group engagement to 'Consult' level on the IAP2
   Public Participation Spectrum.

#### Part 3 - Demographics and Trends

 Identify and discuss current trends related to demographics, parks, the Valley Trail, and recreation trails within the Whistler system.

#### Part 4 - Background Considerations

- Review and discuss relevant background considerations, including but not limited to;
  - Climate change and resilience;
  - Ecological integrity and stewardship;
  - First Nations consultation;
  - Increasing demand and impacts;
  - Balancing community and resort needs;
  - New park lands;

- Active transportation;
- Ageing infrastructure;
- o Fiscal reality; and
- o Funding strategies.

#### Part 5 - Vision, Guiding Principles, Goals

Develop a vision, guiding principles and goals for the Strategy.

#### Part 6 – Emerging Directions for the Future

- Develop an updated spectrum of park types; and
- Complete an analysis of existing select parks to determine where amenities might be more or less suited.

#### Part 7 - Implementation Summary

Identify priorities and provide recommendations for the long-term planning of park.


