Plywood for Gym Floor: Safety equipment is crucial for all programs run by Whistler Gymnastics. One of the areas of the gym that requires an upgrade is underneath our gymnastics floor. Our spring gymnastics floor sits on top of a thin layer of rubber matts that were installed as part of the original gym space from the 2010 Winter Olympics. Unfortunatley, the cushioning effect of these rubber pads lessens the springing effect of our floor which results in a less than optimal gym floor. By placing a layer of plywood flooring on top of the rubber matts, our spring floors will provide maximum rebound for increased performance and decreased impact mitigating injury and athlete wear and tear. We are requesting \$3,059.64 to cover the cost of the plywood.

This grant would help pay the wages of the facilitator of this program. The plan for the year is to offer a 2.5 hour playgroup three times a week (Tuesday and Thursday) year round. Cooler months the playgroup runs in the Millar Room ay Myrtle Phillip Community Centre and in the warm summer months, the playgroup moves outdoors in one of the local parks. This would equate to approximatley 250 hours of playgroup time for Whistler families with young children. We sometimes has guest speakers from other community services attending program and connecting with families.

Playgroups provide parents with an opportunity to learn from one another, to improve their parenting skills and knowledge about their children's needs, and to develop a strong social support network that they can draw on for emotional and practical support when needed. It really is the modern day 'village'. Children who attend playgroups during early childhood have significantly better child development when they start school. The benefits of playgroup are seen across all domains of child development: physical, social, emotional, language and cognitive development, and communication. This why these programs are so important.

Early childhood experiences profoundly affect later health, education, and employment outcomes.

There is a window of opportunity from 0 to 6 when we can get children on a trajectory towards health, education, and employment. Adverse experiences, like low income, poverty, neglect, and food insecurity, cause developmental delays in children and lead to poor future outcomes. The biggest determining factors on a child's early experiences are their parents or primary caregivers.

Many Canadian parents don't have the skills, resources, or knowledge they need to provide those nurturing early experiences.

This is an upstream program that reduces the need for more expensive interventions. The purpose of this grant is to support the operation of a playgroup in Whistler for families of young children.

This playgroup is run as part of our Child Care Resource and Referral program (CCRR). The Whistler CCRR consultant is the facilitator of the playgroup.

/Canadian children have increasingly delayed development. One measure of child development is the Early Development Instrument (EDI). The instrument measures five core areas of early child development that are known to be good predictors of adult health, education, and social outcomes. Recent figures estimate that the 28% of Canadian children are vulnerable in one or more areas of development when tested in Kindergarten (CIHI, 2022), up from 26% in 2014 (CIHI, 2014). In BC, rates of vulnerability are higher with 34.6% of children starting school with vulnerabilities in one or more areas that are critical to their health and that trend is increasing (HELP, 2016).

In fact, in Whistler specifically we have seen an increase recently in the percentage of vulnerable children entering the Whistler school system. For more information about this, please visit the Human Early Learning Partnership (HELP) at the UBC and their EDI dashboard.

Many children are also facing adverse childhood events that we know lead to developmental delays and poor health. Nearly one in five Canadian children live in poverty (First Call, 2021), with food bank usage even before the pandemic in some parts of the country at its all-time highest with a disproportionate number of users being children (Ghoussoub, 2016). One in three Canadian children experiences physical abuse, sexual abuse, exposure to intimate violence, or a combination of these (Boesveld, 2014). The rates of neglect are likely even higher than that (Trocmé, 2005).

Child Care Resource and referral (CCRR) through playgroups responds to these issues and others by supporting the most vulnerable families to provide the best environments for their children.

9. How has your organization considered truth and reconciliation with the Indigenous Nations?

Sea to Sky Community Services' employees, management and Board have, over the life of the organization, contributed by individual or program-based means to the current organizational culture of meaningful intent to pursue Equity, Diversity and Inclusion at all levels of operation. In the fall of 2020, the organization moved beyond intent, beyond these clusters of action, by forming the Diversity Committee. The Committee's first action was to plan monthly meetings to discuss ideas, issues, and most importantly, actions. This committee reviewed and updated the Cultural Diversity Plan, which has evolved into the Cultural Competency, Diversity, and Inclusion Plan. This review led the committee to determine priorities and actions for the coming year. The first phase involved focusing on internal and external communications tools and resources. We began by updating of intake and referral forms, job descriptions, postings and other documentation, making sure that the language in these forms is inclusive. We then shifted the language in our policies and in our external communications (social media, website, etc). This task is still an ongoing process. The committee also began creating and posting inclusive signage on all points of entry: for example, rainbow flags and way-finding for all-gender washrooms.

One year ago, on May 28, 2021, our entire country experienced a reckoning when the T'Kemlups te Secwepemc band in Kamloops, BC was able to present proof, through ground-penetration radar, of the hidden burial of 215 children at the site of the former Kamloops Indian Residential School. An increasing number of additional nations and communities across Canada are using this technology and uncovering this evidence of the harm done to indigenous children, and the very large scale of that harm.

This prompted the Committee to work with Senior Leadership and the Board of Directors on the implementation of several actions:

- The practice of an Indigenous land acknowledgement was integrated into the beginning of all meetings at SSCS.
- Team building days held at the Squamish Lil'wat Cultural Centre, connecting with nations on whose land we work.
- Research was done and guidance was sought to create and implement an agency wide email acknowledgement.
- Orange "Every Child Matters" t-shirts were purchased for every single employee of the organization. Thursday is now orange t-shirt day in the organization.
 Board members and management team held a planning session to review and update the agency Strategic Plan. A collective decision to add a pillar to "build greater diversity and inclusion across the organization" with a specific operational goals to develop an overall agency strategy for this work based on research and best and promising practices in the non-profit environment
- On September 30th 2021, Truth and Reconciliation Day, we held a virtual ceremony with a moment of silence, and guest speakers from our indigenous communities, We shared resources and information in an email to the entire organization.

- Reconciliation" through the Federation of Community Social Services of BC. This training will be complete in October 2022
- While this is difficult work to reckon with, we are glad to report that staff engagement with these initiatives has been impressive. We are encouraged to continue in this work together

Very soon after the revelation of the childrens' burial site, three of our organizational representatives booked meeting with three respected community leaders from the Squamish Nation attended a previously The intention of the meeting was to discuss the possibility of running a youth program around the carving of a totem pole, which would stand as a welcoming beacon to youth approaching the Foundry Youth Services building. This project, and the learning that it has provided to all involved, has become central to our work in right relations with First Nations partners.

Was hired in September of 2022, to take on the Stewardship Officer role. Since joining the SSCS,

has played a key role in guiding relationships with First Nations partners. She has coordinated the Totem Pole project, from the practicality of procuring tools, materials, contracts and locations, to the ceremonial aspects of community engagement with an object of spiritual and symbolic importance. She has worked with the Foundry Indigenous Advisory Committee, building on the strong existing relationship (Operations manager of Squamish Valley Operations for Squamish Nation). The ongoing work with this advisory council is giving rise to conversations and planning around future carving programs, an elder-in-support program, indigenous safety planning in our programs and services, and also joining forces when it comes to

celebrating successes together.

also took on the coordination of the Pemberton Food Hub community: a range of organizations and individuals who are all invested in strengthening food security in the northern regions of the Sea to Sky Corridor. Since joined the SSCS in the fall, in the role of Outreach Manager in Pemberton, the two have worked closely ogether on strengthening relations with Southern Sti'atl'imx First Nations partners in this region. This work is ongoing, and is happening in parallel with the work that have been doing in connecting with Lil'wat Nation at the leadership level.

In February 2022, the Diversity Committee received a grant for training all staff on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion. An in-house training was created and in May this training began to be delivered to different teams in the organization. This has become an opportunity for team building in addition to training. This grant covers the cost of wages for the staff and Board members to attend the one-hour session and snacks are provided. The goal is to have all employees take this training by fall 2022.

In May of 2022, the Stewardship Officer, who is also the Co-Chair of the Diversity Committee, attended the Katz Amsterdam Convening conference in Boulder, Colorado, on Racial Justice in Community Organizations serving in mountain resort communities. It was fascinating to meet others from across the American Continent, and to share thoughts on some very familiar circumstances relating to housing and transportation insecurity, immigration status and how that impacts access to services, and other

barriers including language and, of course, racism.

In the early Spring of 2022, Jody began to incorporate a new project into her role: the coordinating of the organization's work in Cultural Competency, Diversity and Inclusion. This has helped to guide the work of the Diversity Committee, especially in the design and development of the in-house Diversity training modules. coordinating Foundry Sea to Sky's Indigenous Advisory Committee. This committee is working on the formulation of an Elders-in-Support program for youth, which will become a model for cultivating Indigenous consultation and right relations throughout the organization. The Stewardship Officer will be working on the development of an organizational audit of key initiatives, activities, relationships, identifying gaps and areas of growth or relationships to restore. Whistler Nordics Ski Club is requesting funding from the 2024 CEP grant to support the following priorities: coaching and coordination our cross-country ski programs for youth and masters and the coordination and administration of our community events, including the Toonie Ski Series and the Cheryl Morningstar Lost Lake Loppet. Whistler Nordics Ski Club operates within the RMOW recreation and sport category.

One focus of the CEP grant is to support coaching and coordination of our youth and masters programs. Collectively these programs reached more than 175 members this season. Whistler Nordics Ski Club proudly provides programs for youth ages 4 - 16 and adults.

Youth programs include the Coast Corridor United Team (CCU) and the Skill Development Program (SDP). Over the past 20 years the Skill Development Program has delivered programs to hundreds of Whistler youth. The program is aligned with Sport Canada and Nordiq Canada's Long Term Athlete Development Pathway (LTAD). We provide season long programs at both Lost Lake and Whistler Olympic Park, with Lost Lake proving to be the more popular location. The CCU Team is a collaboration between 3 regional clubs to create a performance-focused cohort for U12 to U16 aged racers to represent the regional locally and at away races. The vision is to create a strong cohort, higher level coaching, and a clear athlete development pathway within the corridor. The program grew from 5 to 15 athletes this year and athletes are achieving great results with 4 athletes selected for the BC Winter Games.

Nordiq Canada now requires coaches for children aged 12 to complete additional levels of training for next season and we anticipate additional costs related to training and coaches.

Our Masters program provides skill development for recreational and performance skiers at both Whistler Olympic Park and new this year, Lost Lake. For the first time in many years we offered Masters programming at Lost Lake and registration proved popular. With the current trail closure this program pivoted where possible to Whistler Olympic Park. We plan to build upon the small pilot this year with the help of additional coordination and securing additional adult focused coaches.

The second focus of the CEP grant is to support the coordination and administration of our annual community events including the annual Ski Swap, Toonie Ski Series and the Cheryl Morningstar Lost Lake Loppet. These events provide social connection, promote cross-country skiing within the local community and encourage elements of a healthy lifestyle. They add to the vibrancy of the Lost Lake trails system and create an authentic feel for visitors to the area.

We continue to receive a grant from Nordiq Canada to fund our Head Coach for the club.

Whistler Nordics continues to recuit and train a variety of coaches to support our programming needs. These coaches include BC Team coaches, local high performance athletes, parents with skiing knowledge, high school students and adults looking to help support the community. Every year we support coach development with certification, leadership skills and part time work. Maintaining a roster of paid coaches increases retention, supports youth employment and delivers a quality program experience.

Embracing wind power, sailing inherently boasts a remarkably low carbon footprint. In line with our commitment to environmental responsibility, WSA is actively engaged in converting gasoline motorized coach boats to electric propulsion. Our objective is to achieve the distinction of being the first carbon-neutral sailing school in Canada. With support from the Whistler Blackcomb Foundation environmental fund, WSA has successfully converted two vessels in our fleet, marking significant strides toward our sustainability goals.

3)Community engagement: Whistler Sailing Association (WSA) places a high priority on community engagement, and its growth has been fostered organically through collaborative efforts within the community. By bringing together like-minded individuals, WSA establishes a shared sense of purpose through friendship, educational pursuits, and healthy competition. This approach encourages active participation, support, and the development of a profound sense of belonging among community members. The cooperative approach involves crucial support from entities such as the Resort Municipality of Whistler (RMOW) for site access, the Community Enhancement Program (CEP) grant, donations from local businesses during our annual fundraiser, and assistance from the Whistler Blackcomb Foundation for select capital expenditures, among others. What we have found in the last 8 years is the need is much greater for PEACE Program Counselling services than what we can offer within 17.5 hours. Our goal is to be able to maintain a 0 or minimal waitlist so that children and youth do not have to wait for service, we know that when people reach out for support, there is often a window of opportunity where engagment is optimal. The \$12,000 funded by the RMOW will go towards approx.7.5 hours of counsellor wages and benefits per week. In addition, to meet the growing needs of the two communities the PearlSpace has made the decision to fund an additional 13 hours per week from our Social Enterprise so we can offer a total of 38 hours per week. We feel that this will allow us to maintain a 0 or minimal waitlist that will best support the needs to children, youth and their families within Whistler and Pemberton.

Last year (April 2022 - Dec 2023), the PEACE Program in Whistler/Pemberton supported children and youth through 122 hours of individual counselling sessions, 91 hours of support groups, 52 parent/caregiver support hours, and 32 family counselling hours. Through the PEACE program, children and youth learn how to identify hard to handle feelings and how to express them in healthy ways, recognize their strengths, and increase their self-confidence and self-esteem. They learn effective problem solving and coping skills, how to define and protect boundaries, how to keep themselves safe and to identify safe and supportive people in their life, and better understand the concept of healthy relationships. Most importantly, children are provided with a safe, supportive, nurturing environment to deal with traumatic events in their lives and learn that they are not alone and not at fault for the conflict/abuse they have witnessed and experienced. Parents/caregivers are involved in the counselling process by learning skills and tools that will enable them to support their child/ren through difficulties associated with separation, divorce and gender-based violence.

We would like to run a camp at one of the start facilities in North America (likely Calgary) however this would require significant parental contributions. BCLA would like to subsidise part of this cost to the parents if at all possible.

Due to the recruitment uptake from our Learn to Luge programs, we will also use a portion of the grant for Team wear which remains the property of BCLA and is leased to athletes (free of charge with a deposit) each season. The team jackets give a sense of community and belonging, plus they are excellent publicity for our organisation. Since the inception of the Teamwear program approximately 5 years ago our young athletes are now older and bigger and therefore we again require some bigger jackets!

The Axemen Rugby Club is a volunteer run club that serves the Sea to Sky corridor rugby community. The club provides the only opportunity to play rugby within the area and attracts players between North Vancouver and as far north as Pemberton. The club currently has 2 mens teams competing in BC Div 2 and 3, a newly formed womens program and a youth section that welcomes all ages.

The purpose of this grant application is to further develop a youth rugby program for school aged children within Whistler. The Axemen Rugby Club are applying for a \$5000 grant to run a rugby program in Whistler throughout 2024. Of which, \$3500 would be put towards high school aged rugby and \$1500 would be used to promote the sport in Whistler Elementary schools.

Over the past few years the club has helped Whistler High School promote rugby and organize a number of exhibition games. As a result of this increased participation, the senior boys team (grade 10-12) has now entered the North Shore Schools league. With the \$3500 grant, the club will support the following: 35 sessions run at \$75 per session, coaching cost at \$2625.

- Coach and Support Snr Boys teams in the North Shore League (spring season) (20 sessions)
- Coach and support the Grade 8-9s team in an exhibition season in the fall of 2024. (10 sessions)
- Run an introductory program for girls rugby (5 sessions)

Support for travel to away games = \$500

Equipment provided, including mouth guards and safety equipment = \$375

Promotion of rugby in Whistler Elementary schools:

The club aims to run introductory sessions for all grade 5, 6, 7 classes in Whistler, teaching TAG rugby, the non-contact version of the game. The club then aim to run a festival of rugby for children of this same age group. With the \$1500 grant, the club will support the following:

- Equipment/Rugby Tags for festival of rugby = \$500 (to be given to schools afterward)
- Introduction to rugby coaching sessions = \$750 (10 coaching sessions across all Whistler Elementary schools).
- Festival organization and promotional material for 'next steps into rugby' = \$250.

Rugby provides a community and a support system for all it's players. A youth rugby program in Whistler opens many future opportunities for playing university sport, provides key social connections and promotes the world rugby values of discipline, respect, integrity, passion and solidarity.

This is the third year running the Whistler School Rugby program. The club has successfully run programs for grades 8-12, helping organize students to play matches against Vancouver schools.

The program aims to work with over 75 high school children and 150 elementary school children in Whistler.

The program aims to provide a pathway for students to play representative rugby for Vancouver region and BC.

A goal of the program is to create a pathway to the Axemen Youth rugby section, who will have competitive teams at each playing age group.

Through community outreach programs have introduced over 1000 school aged children to a new sport. Attended and top fund raising group for recent Whistler Community Services Nightwalk. Axemen Rugby Club gave over 100 meals to Squamish food bank at Christmas 2023. Mens program has over 60 active members, from all over the world and in different areas of the community. Newly formed womens program now gives equal opportunities to play the sport.

The club very recently (Jan 2024) applied for a Rugby Canada grant to support a Community Development Officer in the Sea to Sky. Applying for \$10,000 to support the part time working hours of this position.

The rugby club is planning on raising funds to lead a schools program at Howe Sound High School, Squamish, the RMOW CEP funding will allow the rugby club to replicate the schools program in Whistler.

The club is also awaiting the result of a \$2000 funding bid from Woodfibre, Squamish, this bid will help provide funds for travel costs to games for both the adult and youth section of the rugby club and will have nothing to do with schools programming.

She is an essential asset to the club as she is the only coach in the Sea to Sky region with this certification. Her skills in coaching are needed to bring our athletes from the recreational level to the competitive levels. This is an annual, ongoing expense. (124.8km/day x 3days/week x \$0.46/km x 40weeks/season = \$6888.90/season)

Our events and programs work towards all these outcomes because they all have both public education and research components that complement each other. Additionally, data from BioBlitz is being used to help develop Key Initiative A3.1, A3.2, A3.3 and A3.5 in the Big Moves Climate Action Implementation Plan. Overall, our annual BioBlitz events help us move towards our community's vision of a place where nature is protected.

Specifically:

- 1) Funding will go towards presentations on the wonders of nature and biodiversity to students in Whistler and Mount Currie. Nature education leads to appreciation, which leads to stewardship. From all the great feedback we've gotten from the public, students and teachers alike, we know our events have helped community members on their journey towards stewardship/restoring the natural environment in Whistler.
- 2) Funding will go to collecting data about the species that call Whistler home. With more data about the species that live in Whistler, better management decisions can be made to support biodiversity. Although this is fundamentally true, information alone is not enough. Without political will (fostered by increased stewardship in point #1), biodiversity conservation can get ignored.
- 3) Funding this program will also generate hope and connection. Our BioBlitz events have been uncovering new species every single year. At a time when most news is about the decline of biodiversity, new species discoveries are hopeful news to celebrate as a community. We also encourage citizen science by introducing students and residents to iNaturalist, an online social network of people sharing biodiversity information to help each other learn about nature. This information can then be used by researchers to advance understanding of our natural world and how best to use limited resources to protect it. When people feel they are part of the solution, it can help counter the looming environmental doom experienced by many.



BioBlitz biologists will again present to classes in local schools, and at the Xit'olacw School in Mt. Currie. We finally achieved our goal of including Lil'wat youth and educators with successful presentations in 2022. Last year, the timing of our event unfortunately did not work for Xetolacw School, but we intend make sure we can return in 2024.

In June 2023, scientists gave presentations to 38 classes (about 750 youth participants!) at Spring Creek Community School, Myrtle Philip Community School, Whistler Secondary, and École La Passerelle.


Providing data essential to an effective strategy to protect nature

Collection of species data involves scientists scouring different ecosystems to increase our knowledge about the diversity of species in our area. In total, volunteer contributions for BioBlitz exceed 1,000 hours each weekend. In just 17 weekends of BioBlitz spanning back to 2007, BioBlitz findings now represent close to half of all records on the Whistler Biodiversity Project (WBP) master list (www.whistlerbiodiversity.ca). Results from the 2023 BioBlitz will bring the total number of species documented in our area close to 5,000. This exact number will be finalized in the coming months as our volunteers confirm identification of hard to identify species and collate data. Please see figures 1 & 2 below.

The highest priority initiative in the RMOW's Big Moves Climate Action Implementation Plan Adaptation Goal 3 is to: "Develop policy, planning and legislative strategies to protect and restore local ecosystem health and support continued provision of natural infrastructure services. E.g. develop/implement Priority Habitat Strategy and Species & Ecosystems at Risk Plan." BioBlitz events provide data for this plan.

There are more than 30 years of bird research in Whistler that fell under the umbrella of the Naturalists when we formed in 1999. Our bird studies program consists of three main elements:

- 1. CHRISTMAS BIRD COUNT: Occurs mid-December and involves a day of intense bird observation by a large group of birders spread out over Whistler. Data is also collected for three days before and after the Christmas Bird Count and submitted to the Christmas Bird Count international database. Funding will go towards food for hard working volunteers after a long day of birding at a wrap up party. Normally the wrap up party is at someone's house starting in 2023 we needed to rent a space since we needed more space due to increased participation.
- 2. BREEDING BIRD SURVEY: Occurs early June and involves a group long-term Whistler Breeding Bird Surveyors collecting observations along Highway 99. Data is submitted to the Breeding Bird Survey international database. Funding will go towards transportation and accommodation for the birding team that come from out of town.

Why do BBS birders come from out of town? The BBS started in the late 1970s and most of that same group of six bird experts are still involved. Two live on Vancouver Island, one on the Sunshine Coast, and three live in the Greater Vancouver area. Each year they meet in Horseshoe Bay to ride in the same rental van to Whistler. Ferry and ancillary costs to get to that meeting point are not included in our funding application, nor is all the time these experts donate. The funding covers rental vehicle; gas, and accommodation. No birders of their caliber and physical ability (most identifications are made by sound; hence good hearing is necessary) reside in Whistler and are willing to donate their time. In addition, continuity from year to year improves accuracy and consistency of the data.

3. MONTHLY BIRD COUNTS: Occur the first Saturday of each month where we walk from the bottom of Lorimer Road to Rainbow Park and back. Takes roughly 3 hours each month. We introduced a second monthly bird walk to Green Lake on the third Saturday of the month in 2023 to highlight the wonderful diversity of birds in the area, and in response to unauthorized cutting of bird habitat (riparian vegetation) and off-leash dogs disturbing nesting shorebirds. The Green Lake bird walks are now on hold until spring. Though our monthly bird walks happen most regularly, there is no cost to run them. We include them here, so you have a full picture of our birding program. Data is entered into eBird, a collaborative enterprise with hundreds of partner organizations, thousands of regional experts, hundreds of thousands of users, and is managed by the Cornell Lab of Ornithology.

CLIMATE CONSIDERATIONS: Bird populations are declining around the world. And while many factors contribute — from habitat loss to pesticides, outdoor cats, and window collisions — it is increasingly clear that climate change is an important driver behind this worrying trend.

Climate patterns have shifted throughout Earth's long history, but the speed of human-caused climate change in the Anthropocene is unprecedented, making it more difficult for birds to adapt. So how do changing climatic conditions affect birds? Our Bird Study Programs helps find that out by entering all our observations into databases that are available for study.

Changes in climate can affect ecosystems by influencing animal behavior and ranges. Birds are a particularly good indicator of environmental change for several reasons:

Each species of bird has adapted or evolved to favor certain habitat types, food sources, and temperature ranges. In addition, the timing of certain events in their life cycles—such as migration and reproduction—is driven by cues from the environment. For example, many North American birds follow a regular seasonal migration pattern, moving north to feed and breed in the summer, then moving south to spend the winter in warmer areas. Changing conditions can influence the distribution of both migratory and non-migratory birds as well as the timing of important life cycle events.

Birds are easy to identify and count, and thus there is a wealth of scientific knowledge about their distribution and abundance. People have kept detailed records of bird observations in Whistler for more than thirty years.

There are many different species of birds in Whistler living in a variety of habitats, including lakes, wetlands, alpine, forest and meadow. If a change in behavior or range occurs across a range of bird types, it suggests that a common external factor might be the cause.

The purpose of this grant funding is to improve our organisation's impact in two key areas: 1) reduce the organisations environmental footprint; and 2) First Nations engagement.

Specifically, the organisation is requesting funding for the following activities:

- 1. Partner with AWARE Whistler to bring their Zero Waste Hero's program to the Whistler Farmers Markets. AWARE hosts a station at the market location where customer waste is directed into the correct stream (e.g. landfill, compostable, recyclable etc.) and disposed of appropriately. There is an educational component where the community can engage with AWARE staff. AWARE also work with our members/vendors to educate them and help them make environmentally friendly choices for packaging. The cost to the Whistler Farmers' Market in 2023 for this service was \$4.495 and we estimate this to be over \$5.000 in 2024.
- 2. The Whistler Farmers' Market would like to increase our focus on celebrating First Nations. Given the proximity of the market location in the Upper Village to the SLCC, we see an opportunity to better engage with the SLCC. WFM would like to pay First Nations ambassadors to do a traditional welcome at the Whistler Farmers Market on a regular basis, and (if budget allows) on occasions have a tent with craft activities for market visitors to participate in. A grant of \$3,000 would allow the WFM to come to a meaningful arrangement with the SLCC for the 2024 season. The WFM would also allocate \$1,000 of our budget towards this partnership.

Partnering with AWARE is not a new activity for the Whistler Farmers' Market. For 2023, funding from CEP covered 78% of AWARE's fees for attending Sunday markets.

The proposal for First Nations engagement is a new focus. The goals of this program would be to:

1) have an SLCC cultural ambassador to attend at least 50% of the markets and perform a traditional welcome, while also promoting the fact that the SLCC is walking distance from the market and an excellent activity for customers to do after their time at the market. 2) provide tent space once a month to the SLCC, ideally for free craft activities for market customers. However, we would take guidance from the SLCC on what is appropriate and achievable.

3. Current Year Highlights and Community Benefits:

- The WFM hosts markets from May to October, allowing access for the community and visitors to essential items such as produce and food, while also creating a vibrant space for enjoyment. Just as importantly, the market serves as a space for local farmers, producers and creatives to sell their items and make an income. It is estimated that the WFM will be able to work with 140+ vendors in total for the 2024 season and host up to 70 vendors weekly. We estimate an average customer attendance of 4-6K people weekly.
- WFM works closely with the Whistler Community Services Society and the BC Association of Farmers' Markets (BCAFM) to support food security. An average of \$12K (annually) worth of fresh produce reaches community members in need via the BCAFM's Farmers Market Nutrition Coupon Program. Additionally, the Whistler Food Bank collects and distributes produce from the weekly markets.
- WFM is looking to strengthen our relationship with First Nations in 2024 as detailed in this application.
- WFM provides employment opportunities via: participation in the Canada Summer Jobs Program providing employment opportunities for youth, hiring 1-2 additional employees during market season and welcoming volunteers into the organisation.

The Whistler Chamber Music Society (WCMS) is applying for a CEP grant of \$2000 to subsidize performer fees for the concerts presented in 2024. WCMS hires accomplished professional musicians who are fairly remunerated. Performance fees are by far the largest expense for the WCMS.

The Chamber Music Society was formed in 2017 with the intent to enable local music lovers to hear quality classical music without travelling to the city. The performers are professional musicians playing in ensembles of 1 - 6 on a variety of instruments - strings, brass, wind, guitar, piano and voice. They are encouraged to play a wide selection of music and to chat about their intruments and the pieces they are playing, something the audiences appreciate.

Concerts are held on Sunday afternoons at 5 PM, and last approximately one hour with no intermission. This time as proven to be extremely popular with visitors and locals alike. All concerts are now held in Maury Young Arts Centre theater.

The WCMS has found these concerts appeal to Whistler audiences, which include mostly local residents and many of our older Whistlerites. From its beginnings the Society has built up a loyal audience. This was interrupted by the two-year hiatus due to Covid 19. In the last two years we have seen our audiences grow. On Oct. 15, 2023, the lan Parker concert was attended by 153 adults, 26 youth. On Feb. 4, 2024, we hosted a piano and violin concert to 177 adults and 20 youth.

We booked three concerts for this spring, 2024: Kai Gleusteen &Catherine Ordronneau, a piano/violin duo on Feb. 4, La Modestine on March 10, and The Four Jays on April 7. We plan for two more concers in the fall of 2023, but negotiations are not yet finalized

1. \$1,500.00 for Accounting and Administrative Costs--

We are requesting funds to cover a small amount of our every growing "non-pool" related support system. This work consists of processing payroll, registering athletes three times per year, ordering equipment and supplies, maintaining the daily books and records, producing quarterly and annual financial statements, paying bills, filing taxes and license fees, reviewing contracts, filing annual and periodic reports, organizing board meetings, as well as responding to daily emails and inquiries.

2. \$500.00 for Training Equipment--

Due to general wear and tear, as well as the pool chemicals, about half of our daily training equipment such as kick-boards, pull-buoys and flippers used for our Bronze and Masters groups require replacement yearly. Grant monies for this would ensure an upgrade of all of the less-than-optimal items this spring.

3. \$2,000.00 for Away Meet Coaching and Travel Costs--

As our club athletes continue to progress, we have more and more athletes wanting to compete at higher levels. As such, we would like to offer the opportunity for anyone wishing to register for more competitive meets in Richmond, Victoria, Kelowna or Kamloops to be able to do so. These two to three-day meets are invaluable for swimmers to experience real competitions, gain confidence and strive for excellence. Participation in these meets can also showcase these swimmers to potential High-Performance and University Coaches, should they be interested in pursuing their swimming at an elevated level in the future. Our registration costs do not cover all the expenses necessary for us to enter as many meets as we would like, therefore, we are requesting funding to cover a small portion of coaching costs and coaches travel expenses to help ensure that athletes of all ages and abilities may participate.

4. \$500.00 for our Junior Coaching Program Expenses--

This program gives swim club athletes (ages 14-16) the opportunity to learn coaching skills under the close supervision of our Head Coach and earn an hourly wage while doing so. The Junior Coaches learn valuable lessons about responsibility, respect, and responsiveness, which they will carry into their adult lives. Ultimately, the Junior Coaches will have the opportunity to mentor younger swimmers on their own, and the Club will have a pipeline of experienced candidates from which to recruit Assistant Swim Coaches in the future. To date we have had over 10 enthusiast participants who have continued coaching with us throughout their breaks in their University schedules and beyond.

Our club continues to provide a significant amount of its own direct support through its two annual fundraising events: our Annual Swim-a-Thon (during the first week of each November) and our annual SeaWolves Invitational Swim Meet (the last weekend in May). This fiscal year, our Swim-A-Thon raised over \$14,000, and we anticipate that our May Meet will raise close to \$2,000. Furthermore, due to increasing interest and requests from other clubs in and around the Sea-to-Sky corridor, North Van and the Sunshine Coast, are also planning a new Winter Whistler SeaWolves Invitational in late November 2024 which we hope will become an annual event.

We typically have between 80-90% of our club's junior athletes participating in both the swim-a-thon as well as our home swim meets. In addition, approximately 75% of their parents volunter either as lap counters, timers, officials or hosts. The funds raised by these events help defray the costs of registration for all participants, thus allowing us to offer one of the lowest fees for competitive swim programs in the greater Vancouver area.

It offers intense cardio training, and improves personal health while minimizing any forced impact to the body. It is also a very important rehabilitation activity, as well as being an important part of an amateur or high-performance athlete's cross-training program. Furthermore, since it is an indoor sport in a temperature-controlled environment without weather dependencies, swim training can take place year-round, further enriching community life.

As part of our club guidelines we request that parents of our athletes volunteer at least two times per year--at one (or both) of our fundraising events and/or our periodic time-trials. We also try to encourage parents to get back into the pool with their kids at our annual Family Swim Meet. There are three parts to this application, recognising the different areas of AWARE's operations and ability to reach their community through varying programs and educational outreach both in-person and online. AWARE would like to apply for the following through the 2024 CEP grant:

1.GROW - Increase Cheakamus Community Outdoor Garden Capacity

The GROW program increases in popularity every year. In the last two years we have had a waitlist of over 25 people looking for boxes.

The grant would provide funding to expand Cheakamus Community Outdoor Garden. With continued growth in housing and rental development, the garden site needs to be capitalised. Specifically, we need 6 new boxes, and 10 boxes rebuilt to maximise their capacity.

In addition to addressing the global need for food security the program also addresses RMOW goals of community well-being, reducing 'food miles' and associated carbon emissions, and reducing waste from packaging free food.

2. Zero Waste Heroes - Educational Assets

Zero Waste Heroes is AWARE's social enterprise working with local events to design out waste, divert waste from landfill during event days, and educate station users on recycling best practices. Also located in the Whistler parks and at Whistler Farmers Markets on the weekends, this program has over 40,000 station users every year. Currently station education predominantly happens through the station host, whilst extremely effective we want to increase the stations ability to educate the user beyond the hosts interaction.

Funds will be used to create new educational tools and fun educational games that can easily be transported and integrated into the current Zero Waste Station setup. For example, increasing station signage for event grounds with impactful messages e.g. identifying common contaminants in our local recycling / compost streams.

In addition, our current Zero Waste educational assets are out-of-date. Funds will also allow us to update existing resources to reflect changes to the current recycling best practices.

3. Keela Annual Subscription + Updates:

The AWARE team works both remotely and from the office depending on program requirements. Improved technology better connects staff with casual employees and allows us to more effectively deliver programs in the community. As subscription fees increase we struggle to maintain online systems required to support our casual workforce and contacts database. Our contact management system introduced through COVID has become an essential tool to run operations and connect with the community (particularly with members, program participants (e.g. GROW), volunteers and donors).

Introducing the Keela Campaigns tools for programs and fundraising will enable AWARE staff to streamline administration and seamlessly connect systems (project management, scheduling, financial management).

Added two new high profile events to our growing Zero Waste Heroes Events portfolio - helping more events design out waste, reduce overall waste produced, increase waste diverted, as well as engaging their participants on waste diversion + reduction best practices.

Served over 48000 people at Zero Waste Stations as at Whister parks, Whistler farmers market, and third-party events across the Sea to Sky, including Crankworx and the Arc ' teryx Climbing Academy.

Diverted over 5000kg of waster from the landfill.

Provided prowing space for over 400 gardenes.

1000 local community members participate in Go By Bike initiatives.

Offered 5 different events for community members to participate in the movement towards a circular economy - clothing swap, garage sale and repair cafe's.

In 2024, AWARE will bring to the table a reinvigorated strategic plan. AWARE's mission remains the same; safeguarding habitat, biodivensity and wilderness values; and building sustainable, resilient communities. In the first iteration of our strategic intent, the 2024 plan will look to operate an umbrella of Circular Economy, in this context, the programs offered by AWARE can be seen supporting a wider ambition on climate. We propose to embark on a direct campaign to enlist wider support from community members through a variety of advertising, marketing, workshops and engagement activities to build momentum both for AWARE as the spokesperson for environmental stewardship and to build increased leverage for appropriate, urgent, and community driven actions on climate. We look forward to the year ahead.

AWARE enters each year with zero dollars of secure funding. Since 2019, we have secured close to \$300,000 per year for delivery of Whistler-focused conservation and climate related programming. We have achieved this by building a mixed model with (annually) around one third of revenues coming from grants, fundraising, donations and memberships, one third from project contracts, and the remaining third from our Zero Waste Heroes social enterprise. This year, to diversify unrestricted funds we are focussing on increasing fundraising opportunities, community and membership engagement.

We are early on in the year 2024. To date we have not received any rejected / non-approved funding requests at this stage.

Whistler Adaptive is requesting \$8,500 to support our Whistler-based adaptive sport programs and to support a bursary program for low-income Whistler residents.

Adaptive Sport Programs

WAS' adaptive sport programs provide year-round sport, recreational and therapeutic opportunities for hundreds of people with disabilities in the Sea to Sky area and tourists from around the globe. WAS' multi-sport programs are offered seven days a week for local Sea to Sky athletes and can also be reserved by visitors to the Whistler area.

Funding from the RMOW would be used to support bursaries to local athletes with disabilities, as well as a small contribution to program costs:

Program Costs

We are requesting a small contribution to help support the cost of offering our programs. This would include items such as volunteer recruitment and training, supplies for our summer camps, and signage for programs.

Bursary Program

WAS programs are offered at a nominal fee in order to remain financially accessible for participants. However, living with a disability or neurodiversity can add significant costs to the family budget, making even low-cost programs challenging for some Whistler families to afford.

Through this grant, we will be able to offer bursaries to low income Whistler residents aged 3 and up. Individuals are able to apply for up to \$1000 per year across our four-season programming. The bursary covers between 30-75% of a participants' fees in our community based sessions, depending on the frequency and type of program. Some Whistler Residents use Whistler Adaptive programming over 100 times a year, which would be directly supported through the RMOW funding of Whistler Resident bursaries.

Bursary recipients must pass a financial means test and are vetted by a three person Bursary Committee who vote on the funding recommendations of our Athlete Coordinator. Bursary recipients also write a thank you letter to our bursary funders some of which we have included here.

This Winter WAS welcomed a new Executive Director, Sian Blyth, the original founder of the organization and a long-time supporter. We also successfully reignited our volunteer program, which had suffered from the pandemic.

Other highlights included two visits from the Duke and Duchess of Sussex, who visited our adaptive ski program on Whistler Mountain. We also worked with AMI-tv to showcase the sport of adaptive Nordic Skiing in the Callaghan Valley.

Throughout the year we partnered with many organizations for special events including the Invictus Games, Camp Goodtimes and Canuck Place. Our Ski and Ride program in partnership with Vail Resorts gave over 1,300 lessons and our community multi-sport programs gave an additional 1,500 adaptive sports lessons to those living in the Sea to Sky and Vancouver.

The need for adaptive sports programming:

A 2022 study by the University of Toronto's Faculty of Kinesiology and Physical Education determined that "based on available evidence, children and adolescents with disabilities received a grade of D for overall physical activity, F for active play and a C+ for organized sport and physical activity." These failing grades support what we already know: that individuals living with disabilities face many barriers in maintaining their health/wellbeing. Adaptive sports, recreation and gym equipment is hard to find. Local facilitators don't often have the knowledge, skills or confidence to support individuals with a physical disability. Parents of those living with a cognitive disability/Autism spend most of their time and energy focused on meeting daily needs like school, medical appointments, and managing challenging behaviours (University of Toronto, 2020). Many cannot participate in school or community teams and need extra support to participate in physical activity. And we know that people living with disabilities, and their families, often experience high levels of social isolation and struggle to feel a sense of belonging in their communities.

WAS programs support this vulnerable and under-served population by providing access to sports and recreation activities that help to build physical literacy skills for life.

Programs are tailored to the individual participants, including any adaptive equipment and specialized instruction needed to have a safe and enjoyable experience. Our summer programs offer outdoor sport and recreational programming such as hiking, biking, and athletics, as well as kayaking, canoeing, rowing and paddle boarding. Our winter programs include alpine ski and snowboard, Nordic skiing, and snowshoeing. Throughout the year we offer swimming lessons, yoga, strength and conditioning and other indoor activities.

As a leader in adaptive sports and recreation, we provide visitors to Whistler with unique offerings year-round. For many families traveling with person with a disability, the option of an adaptive sports and recreation program, accessible accommodations, and inclusive transportation heavily influence where they vacation. Our adaptive ski and snowboard program is one of the best in the world and attracts many families to visit the Whistler area, providing over 1,500 lessons to people from around the globe each year and bringing thousands of dollars to the local economy. WAS is also a leader in the emerging sport of adaptive mountain biking, bringing dozens of adaptive mountain bikers to Whistler each year through its athlete camps and private lessons and inspiring local businesses like Vail Resorts to follow in our footsteps. Our ongoing work on local accessibility and inclusion has helped make Whistler one of the most accessible resort communities in Canada, and we take the time to work with journalists, filmmakers, tourism groups, and so many others to help promote the destination as inclusive, innovative and welcoming. We are requesting \$10,000 to support the current and upcoming alumni of our Work 2 Live program. These participants have found a home in our community and continue to work, live, and explore in the Sea to Sky Corridor. Over 111 participants have graduated from Work 2 Live since 1998. We are currently actively supporting 8-10 graduates at any one time (approximately 16 total per year). Our largest cost is staffing, which is the most impactful and also the most difficult to find funding for. For this reason,we rely on the RMOW's support to help cover this incredibly important part of our program.

Work 2 Live is a thriving supportive employment and housing program for our province's most vulnerable young people—those who are experiencing poverty, mental health issues, and/or homelessness. Most are Indigenous, 2SLGBTQ+, or have aged out of government care, or a combination of the three. They come to Whistler to find stability and family in the mountains, just like generations of other young people have done for years.

Unlike some other programs that serve youth, we do not allow our participants to age out; rather, we continue to support them with the same unconditional care we give to current participants in the program while we help them transition into stable, healthy independence. Throughout the program, we become a part of their safety net, many of whom have no close, reliable, natural support systems.

Similar to 2021, 2022 and 2023, we will again go toward wages of our Co-Executive Directors and one-on-one support for alumni of our Work 2 Live program. This will look like:

- Mental health support (trauma-informed, low-barrier counselling provided through Vancouver Coastal Health, WCSS, the Howe Sound Women's Centre, and referrals to community programs)
- Emergency funding (groceries, bills, healthcare, debt and other emergency costs)
- Housing support (help finding, securing, and maintaining healthy housing in the Sea to Sky Corridor)
- Employment support (help finding, securing, and maintaining employment in the Sea to Sky Corridor)
- Life skills education & training (RentSmart Certificate, budgeting, soft skills, etc.)
- Practical and emotional support (through individual check-ins)
- Providing direct support to alumni (ranging from driving them to and from appointments, supporting them through suicide attempts, helping them pack and move out of bad living situations, buying bags of groceries and dropping them off when they've been ill, providing personal references for jobs and landlords, and more!)
- Training and supporting the rest of the Programming Team to follow through with other supports for grads, as-needed

One of the most important ways we are supporting an end to youth homelessness is to understand our work through the lens of decolonization.

Homelessness is not the result of the individual's choices or character; it is a direct result of the process of colonization and the resulting systems that uphold it: racism, sexism, homophobia, capitalism, white supremacy, etc. The harms perpetuated by these systems create an environment where certain people can become homeless or precariously housed.

Zero Ceiling believes that the key to ending youth homelessness is to look back to pre-colonization for inspiration. We choose to disrupt these systems, guided by the principles of unconditional love, relationships and community, safety nets, connection with the land, and courage.

Decolonization, for us, is not limited to welcoming Indigenous Peoples to our programs and operations; we are using it as a guide for how to do this work in a good way. This includes decolonizing our own internal systems and processes, as well as our programs and approach.

Some key actions we take that are inspired by this lens are:

- Developing protocols to accompany policies and procedures that will guide how we do this good work in a good way.
- Creating the "Zero Ceiling Auntie" role Auntie is an Indigenous elder from a nearby First Nation who gives maternal unconditional love, guidance, and cultural support to our program participants and staff.
- Monthly J.E.D.I. Temple (Justice, Equity, Decolonization, and Inclusion working group) meetings to further this work, attended by the majority of our core staff.
- Compulsory training on cultural safety for Indigenous Peoples, Mental Health First Aid, and suicide prevention training for all staff and board members as well as partners working directly with youth.
- Redesigning our systems and processes based on natural cycles and our connection with the land.
- Embracing non-white, non-capitalist approaches, such as Community-Centric Fundraising.

CEP funding is requested to support the Sunday Concert Series. This program provides eight summer afternoon community concerts under the lakeside tent at The Point Artist-Run Centre. This

is a family-friendly event with affordable tickets (\$15) with discounts for children and youth. Snacks and light refreshments are served from the café. This program has a capacity of 400 tickets, provides work for more than 20 Musicians, generates 16 contract shifts, and offers 32 volunteer opportunities. The total program cost is \$13,700 and PARC is requesting \$4,000 to pay some portion of Artist Fees and AV Contractors required for program operations.

PARC is also requesting funds to contribute to grant writer fees necessary to deliver a successful grant seeking strategy. PARC depends on public funding to ensure accessible registration, rental, and ticket fees for all artists and the community. PARC has developed a multi-year plan to seek municipal, community, and provincial funding to support the delivery of engaging and affordable programs. - 1. Housing While PARC isn't in a position to improve secure housing, we acknowledge solutions are required to address housing challenges and offer a space where creatives that cannot secure creative space in a residence are offered affordable private and shared creation and workspace.
- 2. Climate Action PARC provides a lot of low to no-waste programs. PARC reduces waste by composting, recycling, and no single-use products. For off site venues at The Flag Stop Festival, PARC selects food vendors with compostable serving materials and provides water stations for refillable personal cups. The off site beer garden serves local brewery beer in compostable cups from beer kegs to reduce waste management for a mass of empty cans. There is no single-use serving dishware or glassware at dinner and on-site bar events. We even work from a re-purposed building: the former Whistler hostel site on Alta Lake. Our event and program promotions encourage attendees to access the festival on foot, bike, stroller, and, in some cases, boat. There is limited parking at The Point Artist Run Centre where anyone arriving by car is encouraged to carpool or take a taxi.

PARC acknowledges the traditional and unceded territory at every event, on the website, and in promotions and communication. For many events, Knowledge Keepers are requested to conduct an Opening Ceremony.

The Artistic Director who does all the programming, ensures multiple Indigenous artists and Knowledge Keepers are part of programming every year.

PARC artists and productions include many different Indigenous cultures and disciplines. The centre has featured Lil'wat award winning musical acts Kalan Wi and Spiritual Warriors, art work by Lil'wat artist Art Pascal, theatre mentorship by Squamish-based Cree actor Lorne Cardinal, performances by East Vancouver BIPOC band Soul Rebel, Black female artist Xhalida September, and stand-up comedy by Black comedian Dino Archie, among many others. PARC will continue programming diverse cultural artists.

The Indigenous Artisan Showcase from mid June to the end of July featured artists from the Lil'wat, Musqueam and Hulqimelem Nations. Consultation with PARC Indigenous board members was an important element of the planning and delivery of this exhibit.

The Counselling Assistance program support community members with low financial barrier access to help from a clinical counselor. Many community members who seek support from outreach workers at WCSS could also benefit from additional help from a trained professional clinical counselor, although not all community members have the financial means or extended benefit programs that would cover the cost.

When it is identified that the services of a professional service provider would be beneficial, our outreach workers work with community members to find the best fit of a counselor. If financial restriction is a barrier to accessing the service on their own, this is when the Counselling Assistance program kicks in. Community members are matched with a suitable counselor, and are subsidized for up to 6 sessions in a calendar year. The cost to the community member is approx \$35 per session, while WCSS and the counseling assistance program pays the remaining \$100 per session. WCSS outreach workers continue to support and work alongside the community member to ensure complete wrap around support while they are working with a clinical counsellor.

In 2023 more than 100 people in community were supported through this program, at a cost of over \$50,000

Counselling assistance is one of over 30 programs administered by WCSS in the community. Outreach services offers programs such as concussion support, one on one wellness support meetings, cold weather shelter operations, new parent support group, mental health ambassador training, etc. Our food security team supports the community with Food Bank and in school snack programs. In total over 25,000 client visits were supported in our space. We also operate social enterprises including the Re-use-It and Re-Build-It centres which divert waste from the landfill, offer low cost foods to community members, and generate revenue to support the operations of the organization.

The grant will be used to fund part of the honorarium for our 2024 Whistler Writer in Residence guest author. The author/mentor honorarium is \$6,000 to participate in the two month long program, which is comparable with other WIR programs. We kindly request the Community Enrichment Program (CEP) cover 50% (\$3,000) of the 2024 Writer in Residence honorarium. The Whistler Writing Society will take care of all other costs associated with the program, including the author s travel, administration, accommodation and promotion of the program.

The CEP grant is important to our local writers because it makes the program affordable to residents in the Sea to Sky Corridor. In addition, they do not have to travel to an urban centre to develop their craft and market-orient their work. In 2023, award-winning Writer in Residence Cody Caetano (Half Bads in White Regalia) mentored participants of the program in-person in Whistler at the Alta Lake Cabin at The Point Artist-run Centre. We intend to run the 2024 program in a similar manner as 2023.

The 2024 Writer in Residence author mentor is yet to be confirmed. Our list of candidates includes the following award-winning Canadian authors: Lisa Moore (This is How We Love), Iona Whishaw (To Track A Traitor), Leanne Dunic (Wet), Susan Juby (Meditation on Murder) and Jennifer Manuel (The Heaviness of Things That Float). This list of award-winning authors have attended our festival before and are highly respected writing teachers and coaches. We strive to include and highlight BIPOC and LGBTQ2SI+ author/ mentors and participants to bring diverse experiences and perspectives to all our programming. Our writer in residence candidate list will expand as we understand the availability of these author/mentor candidates.

We plan to include a scholarship position for one of the 10 writer/participants, which will go to a BIPOC writer.

Our program addresses the four CPI priorities:

- 1. The Writer in Residence (WIR) program utilizes artist-designated housing and does not reduce housing for local residents, yet provides enriching, career development for local writers in our own community.
- 2. The program is open and not prescriptive in the support of artistic content. However, many writers in our Corridor (and visiting guest mentors) are writing about the impacts of climate change in their fiction and non-fiction. The WIR program means that local writers don't have to travel to an urban centre to study the writing craft, thereby reducing CO2 emissions.
- 3. The WIR participants meet other local writers, forming valuable artist networks in our own community. The WIR is a stepping stone to publication, and ultimately, participating in the Whistler Writers Festival as guest authors, which involving local audiences in the celebration of locally-created culture.
- 4. The WIR is a program that shows Whistler can be used as a retreat and place of further development and education for our own literary artists. The program enriches the writing skills of locals -- a benefit to Whistler businesses and Whistler culture -- who will ultimately draw visitors to Whistler through their own artistic works and practice. The high-profile WIR guest author spends two months in Whistler with the opportunity to immerse themselves in Whistler's arts culture; they contribute to local culture through their mentorship of local writers and they participate/present at the Whistler Writers Festival. They are also a draw for festival visitors to Whistler, who appreciate arts, culture and the natural environment.

Reconciliation is one of our values, and we are actively walking this pathway. Our Society's programming has potential to advance reconciliation and decolonization through including/ inviting Indigenous workshop leaders and storytellers as well as Indigenous participants.

2023 Writer in Residence, Cody Caetano, is Indigenous, an off-reserve member of the Pinaymootang First Nation.

We have offered opportunities to study the art and craft of oral storytelling from local Lil'wat and Squamish artists, bringing the art of Indigenous and cultural oral traditions to our audiences, opening the door to fruitful discussions on reconciliation and decolonization, both formally at events and between audience and workshop members helping them build their own personal back pocket reconciliation plans (Chief Joseph, 2023).

For example, in 2022 our audiences learned a few different ways that oral stories in the Lil'wat Nation may be different from non-Indigenous cultures: story touch points often come in sets of four (instead of three); sometimes there is no defined ending to a story and a character 'goes on to have a good life'; character traits are neither seen as 'good' or 'bad,' but a character trait might be used for good or bad. Learning about other cultures ways through storytelling is a meaningful step on the path of reconciliation, and embracing the storytelling arts is a step towards decolonizing the traditional publishing industry.

We partner with Squamish Lil wat Cultural Centre to understand cultural protocols, necessary and appropriate culturally-sensitive research, and network with Indigenous artists and organizations in our region. Through this relationship we have connected with both Lil wat and Squamish Nation artists, included many in our events and programming, including sharing knowledge on artists craft. It is through these relationships that we identify relevant ways forward to ensure meaningful, sensitive representation of materials and cultures.

We work directly with the artists involved in the workshops and oral storytelling events to ask how they would like to see them unfold, and how they would like to be represented.

In light of the ongoing increase in living costs, we are determined to avoid raising team fees to maintain accessibility for more individuals. The funding we seek will be allocated to offset equipment and operational expenses, allowing us to sustain our team fees at the same level as the previous year.
